CITY COUNCIL MEETING

JUNE 17, 2013

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4 MAYOR COREY: Okay. Call to order the
5 Prospect City Council meeting of 17, June 2013.

6 Everybody's present.

7 First thing on the agenda is approval of the
8 minutes for the meeting of May 20. Has everybody
9 had a chance to look at those, and, if so, is there
10 a motion to approve them or to correct them?

11 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: So
12 moved.

13 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Second.

14 MAYOR COREY: And in regard to the
15 special council meeting of June 3rd, 2013?

16 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: So moved.

17 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: Second.

18 MAYOR COREY: So ordered. Minutes of
19 May 20th and June 3rd approved and --

20 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: No; we
21 should vote.

22 MAYOR COREY: There's a vote?

23 CITY ATTORNEY POTTS: You -- you do
24 need --

25 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: We

1 need --

2 CITY ATTORNEY POTTS: -- to vote.

3 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: -- to

4 vote.

5 MAYOR COREY: Okay. Technicalities.

6 Any objection?

7 COUNCIL MEMBERS: [no response]

8 MAYOR COREY: All in favor say, "Aye."

9 COUNCIL MEMBERS: Aye.

10 MAYOR COREY: Okay. Did you get that,

11 Ms. Strijek?

12 THE REPORTER: [no audible response]

13 MAYOR COREY: No noes, all ayes.

14 First committee report, Parks and Recreation,
15 update?

16 MS. WARDELL: I'm going let Stuart give
17 the report tonight.

18 MAYOR COREY: All right, Councilman
19 Miles.

20 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: The only real
21 activity is good news, is that they're -- they're
22 progressing on the road into Putney Pond. They
23 have got the -- they've got it set up to pour the
24 curbs. And he said as soon as it stops raining,
25 they will get out there for the curbs. But that's a

1 really big update because once they get the curbs
2 done, it'll -- it should go much quicker.

3 The next thing would be lay the gravel base.
4 And then he'll do a dump truck test, and as soon
5 as it passes the dump truck test, which is he
6 drives the dump truck across it, and if the road
7 doesn't give way, they'll come in and pave it. And
8 that tells him it's dry enough to -- to do the final
9 paving.

10 We've got the bollards on order.

11 And I've talked to the fence company, and
12 they are going to come and install the fence over
13 the spillway.

14 So I think things will all be completed at right
15 about the same time.

16 MAYOR COREY: Anything further?

17 MR. MILES: No.

18 MAYOR COREY: Well, I want to thank
19 Linda Wardell, back there in the red, on Parks and
20 Recreation. She found, in regard to our spending,
21 that we, the city, had paid the archeological dig
22 people when they sent us the bill for \$2500. And I
23 think it was a special dig. They found a couple of
24 buttons and some Sanders chicken bones. But
25 anyway, we had to do it before we could do the

1 park. But, Linda pointed out that the State
2 Commissioner had told us back before we did it,
3 back a year ago, that they would pay for it.

4 So she did the inquiries, and they said, "Yes,
5 we will. Please send us" -- I guess -- "basically a
6 copy of your check and a letter." So that letter is
7 probably mailed by now -- it was signed today --
8 saying we've paid it; here's proof. Will you pay it
9 for us. And so I think we're \$2500 to the good
10 there.

11 Thank you, Ms. Wardell.

12 Forestation Board update. Mr. Tucci?

13 MR. TUCCI: Our contractor, Bob Ray
14 Company, has finished treating the 10-inch
15 diameter and larger ash trees against emerald ash
16 borer. That's Number 1 and that's important.
17 There is emerald ash borer in the area, and it
18 seems as if our treatment system has been
19 working.

20 Number 2, today we completed inventory of all
21 the trees along Rose Island Road on the city side.
22 They've never been inventoried before. There
23 were 60 of those picked up today and added to our
24 over 1500 inventoried trees. So I'm sure we're
25 running over 1600 trees on the inventory list by

1 the time we're done.

2 And the third thing, we just ordered gator
3 bags, which are irrigation devices, for 13 more
4 trees. We've put in actually 14 in the last year or
5 so, new trees. And it doesn't seem like tonight we
6 need them. Who knew? But sooner or later, it will
7 get dry, and this will help protect the trees.

8 End of report.

9 MAYOR COREY: Thank you, sir.

10 Code Enforcement Board?

11 CHIEF SHERRARD: I'll go ahead and
12 give it for tonight.

13 MAYOR COREY: Yes, sir.

14 CHIEF SHERRARD: There are no
15 pending actions before the board for June. And we
16 were supposed to have a committee meeting today,
17 but there were some glitches in the schedule, so
18 it's been passed until next month. So nothing new
19 to report.

20 MAYOR COREY: Library Committee?

21 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: We've
22 completed our book sale and room is back to
23 normal upstairs. And I've already packed eight
24 boxes of donations for the next book sale. So
25 things are not changing up there; they're going

1 very well.

2 MAYOR COREY: Good. Thank you.

3 Next item on the agenda, Police Report.
4 Chief?

5 CHIEF SHERRARD: Okay. The -- the
6 house checks were up, I would say, considerably
7 from the same period last year, 1200 versus 900.

8 The citations are way up. The reason for
9 that was the Click It or Ticket It program for the
10 two-week period, where we got the state grant.
11 In -- in those 14 days there was 76 citations that
12 were issued just specific to that grant, and 68 of
13 those were for seatbelt violations. That's actually
14 a lot higher than I thought it would be for such a
15 small area. So that was a pretty good turn out for
16 that.

17 Our non-injury accidents were up three times
18 what they were the previous year. I don't know
19 whether that's an aberration, but it seems like
20 we've had a number of collisions along 42, even
21 just the simple rear-end collisions. I don't know
22 whether it's because the number of distractions.
23 We can't necessarily say it's because of
24 construction yet because it really hasn't started.
25 But it -- it just seems like there is an increase in

1 that. Hopefully, that was just a -- again, an
2 aberration and there's no reason behind it.

3 There's really nothing all that unusual to
4 report about -- or in regards to the different
5 reports that were taken, except there were two
6 incidents much theft of pills from the Walgreens.
7 But as it turned out, it was within the delivery
8 system and no -- nothing within the Walgreen's
9 system. It was a -- a problem out at UPS because
10 that's how they were getting the meds delivered to
11 the -- to the Walgreens, so. . .

12 Let's see. Dispatch runs were up slightly.
13 Officer-initiated runs were -- were up a little bit,
14 as were the burglar alarms.

15 Nothing to -- related to Code Enforcement.

16 Other than that, I guess we're okay.

17 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: What's an
18 officer-initiated run?

19 CHIEF SHERRARD: It's when an officers
20 calls out on the radio and just advises that they're
21 taking action of some kind, whether it would be a
22 traffic stop --

23 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: Oh.
24 Okay.

25 CHIEF SHERRARD: -- or something

1 along that.

2 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: Thank
3 you.

4 MAYOR COREY: Okay. There have been
5 some comments in the past about our audits. We
6 have two companies who -- one does the
7 daily/monthly issues, and you have their proposal
8 here or I'm passing -- oh, this is the sign-in sheet.
9 The proposal is in the book; is that correct?

10 CITY ADMINISTRATOR SIMMS: [no
11 audible response]

12 MAYOR COREY: What is the name of the
13 company?

14 CITY ADMINISTRATOR SIMMS: Chilton
15 Medley.

16 MAYOR COREY: Yeah. It's not there?

17 CITY ADMINISTRATOR SIMMS: No.

18 MAYOR COREY: Let me see. [examines
19 document] Can we get that?

20 CITY ADMINISTRATOR SIMMS: We've
21 got it.

22 MAYOR COREY: I'm sorry. I thought we
23 had it. I know you copied it. I thought, anyway.

24 Anyway, it's just their annual thing -- we'll get
25 it out here -- telling you what they do and what

1 they charge. Here is a copy of it. Review and
2 reconcile balance sheets. Yeah, let's get copies
3 of this. And then what they charge per hour. I
4 think that probably on Chilton Medley it would be
5 very difficult to change. I'm up to suggestions
6 from you-all.

7 Then we have an annual audit of our financial
8 statements. We have used, for years, evidently,
9 Richardson Pennington & Skinner. And there was
10 some conversation about do we need new eyes to
11 look at it? I don't know. I haven't been here long
12 enough. This is the thing that they do once a
13 year. This costs us with them about \$6700. And I
14 don't know whether it's probably a good deal. I
15 don't know. But do you want to look for anybody
16 else?

17 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Are -- are
18 you --

19 MAYOR COREY: Do you want --

20 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: -- talking
21 about, Ken, the -- the \$6700 that's for the -- the
22 Pennington Skinner outfit or is that --

23 MAYOR COREY: Yes, ma'am.

24 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: -- combined
25 for everything?

1 MAYOR COREY: That's for the annual
2 audit.

3 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Just for the
4 annual audit?

5 MAYOR COREY: Uh-huh.

6 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: I see.

7 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: That's 1200 a
8 month.

9 COUNCIL MEMBER SCOTT: Do you know
10 how much, Bill, 1200 a month?

11 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: I think it's
12 1200 a month for the monthly audit and payroll
13 fund [phonetic].

14 MR. SPEAKER: Payroll is --

15 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Yeah.

16 MR. SPEAKER: -- included, yeah.

17 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Payroll is a
18 part of that so that's --

19 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: But
20 that's -- that's not what he's talking about.

21 CITY ATTORNEY POTTS: That's really --

22 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: That's --

23 CITY ATTORNEY POTTS: -- a
24 bookkeeping service --

25 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Right.

1 CITY ATTORNEY POTTS: -- as opposed
2 to an accounting service --

3 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Right.

4 CITY ATTORNEY POTTS: -- as opposed
5 to the audit. We have to have the audit and --

6 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: No choice.

7 CITY ATTORNEY POTTS: Right. And,
8 you know, it's -- that's a reasonable number.
9 Anything under 7500 bucks is usually pretty
10 reasonable.

11 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Actually
12 in the last year, because we had some concerns,
13 Mike Scott and I went and talked with both the
14 people who do our accounting and people who do
15 our auditing. In both instances, and I'll speak for
16 myself, I came away very comfortable with the fact
17 we have professionals doing our work.

18 MAYOR COREY: Good.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: They
20 were very open at answering questions. I didn't
21 come away with any concerns in regard to either
22 group of people. I think there may be some things
23 we can do that make our audits more open, more
24 easy to use, more transparent to the public. But I
25 did not feel that both groups had -- that we needed

1 to replace them because there was a problem.

2 MAYOR COREY: Okay. Good. Does
3 anybody got any questions on that? Yes, ma'am?

4 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: I -- I just
5 want to say, I feel comfortable about the -- the
6 people who do our annual audit only in the sense
7 that they also audit a lot of other small cities, so
8 that they sort of have in the first place an
9 expertise of looking at how small cities are
10 running things and having some sort informal sort
11 of way of sort of saying, Well, they're doing better
12 than these people but not as good as this other
13 city or whatever. To pluck another equally good
14 auditing firm out that audits businesses instead,
15 we would lose that kind of expertise that I have be
16 found reassuring.

17 MAYOR COREY: Good. That's -- that
18 is -- I just wanted a consensus from you-all.

19 If you look at Page 3 of the Mountjoy Chilton
20 Medley document, you see the fees on there. And
21 this is no criticism, I'm glad you guys went and
22 you were satisfied with them.

23 If anybody goes over there or gets them on
24 the horn and so forth, just be aware of the fact
25 that they charge us. I mean, when you were

1 through, they sent us a bill, which is fine. But you
2 might get everybody's questions, if anybody goes
3 over there, as they should charge us. And those
4 are the rates there, \$50 an hour, 70, up to 260,
5 depending on who you talk to.

6 So we'll just keep up with those two.

7 Is there any --

8 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Yeah, the
9 issue --

10 MAYOR COREY: -- objection to that.

11 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: --
12 there -- the issues with the audit relate to the fact
13 that we traditionally have seen them at the
14 December meeting, which means that from the end
15 of June to the meeting in December, we have no --
16 we have no data that has been adjusted at the end
17 of the prior fiscal year.

18 MAYOR COREY: Okay. We can't get it,
19 actually, until almost the third week of July. Even
20 though the fiscal year ends June 30th, we don't get
21 everything for --

22 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: But --

23 MAYOR COREY: -- another --

24 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: -- July
25 to --

1 MAYOR COREY: -- three weeks.

2 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: --

3 December is a very long time.

4 MAYOR COREY: Oh. I -- I don't know in
5 the accounting game. I can't answer that.

6 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Well, no.
7 They di -- the issue is not accounting. It's what
8 we've been talking about in regard to the
9 insurance tax and they way we handle the
10 insurance tax.

11 MAYOR COREY: Is Mr. Weber here?

12 Well, it seems that what we can do is the
13 insurance tax is paid quarterly. And I think Ann
14 and Weber came up with this jointly, you take the
15 first three quarters, add them up, divide by three,
16 take that number and assume that's going to be
17 your fourth quarter. Now does it hit right on the
18 penny, no.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: No.

20 MAYOR COREY: But is there --

21 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: -- but
22 it --

23 MAYOR COREY: -- a better way --

24 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: --
25 would --

1 MAYOR COREY: -- to do it --

2 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: -- allow

3 us --

4 MAYOR COREY: -- Bill?

5 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: No.

6 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: It would
7 allow us to have those in September instead of --

8 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: You could --
9 it -- it's the -- it's the same thing as doing a
10 preliminary budget and amending it as needed. I
11 would -- I would say --

12 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Exactly.

13 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- we could
14 run a trial balance or use whatever, like Daniel
15 suggested. He was a CPA and works on these
16 things.

17 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: M-hm.

18 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: We can easily
19 take, say, a -- a preliminary audit for September
20 versus --

21 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: I agree.

22 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: --
23 September -- middle of September, and then
24 finalize it at the end of the year, and the figures
25 will be very minor --

1 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Well, and
2 all of the adjustments, except for the insurance
3 tax, can already have been completed.

4 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: I -- and it's --
5 it's not going to change very much from September
6 to December.

7 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: No --

8 MAYOR COREY: So --

9 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: -- it
10 won't.

11 MAYOR COREY: -- what we're talking
12 about --

13 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: But you're --

14 MAYOR COREY: -- folks, out there is --

15 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- running two
16 different audits.

17 MAYOR COREY: -- we get this --

18 MR. MILES: Right. This -- that's my
19 question is --

20 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: You're
21 running two audits.

22 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: -- there
23 would be an additional cost, I would guess, in
24 doing that.

25 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Probably a

1 couple --

2 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: But it
3 should be minimum.

4 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- 1500.

5 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: I mean,
6 it's one set of figures.

7 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Right.

8 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: All the
9 other figures would have been completed and the
10 adjustments would have been made. We have been
11 making adjustments as late as January of the
12 following year. And I just personally find that
13 unacceptable.

14 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: It -- the
15 expense would not be --

16 MAYOR COREY: What would --

17 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: --
18 extraordinary.

19 MAYOR COREY: -- you like me to do to
20 direct that?

21 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Well, I --
22 I think that what they're talking about makes total
23 sense.

24 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Yeah. What
25 Ann and Daniel were talking about, I would

1 recommend we do just so that you have --

2 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: I agree.

3 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- a -- a good
4 handle on it, say, September 15th before Council
5 and the City. Any additional expenses --

6 MAYOR COREY: The insurance
7 companies collect premiums from our cars and
8 houses, and they send us a tax on that. We're at
9 their mercy because there's no statutory
10 requirement as to when they send that money. So
11 it may come in at the end of September, it may
12 come in the middle of November, and so that last
13 quarter is always up for grabs.

14 Anything else on that issue?

15 MR. MILES: No. I think --

16 MAYOR COREY: Keep -- keep the
17 auditor, keep the accountant.

18 COUNCIL MEMBER SCOTT: Yeah. Yeah.
19 That's the way to go.

20 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Let's get
21 them staffed [phonetic] quickly.

22 COUNCIL MEMBER SCOTT: Yeah.

23 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: And I'm
24 not sure you're going to have to have two audits
25 either.

1 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: No.
2 Because the only thing changing is insurance.

3 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: Right.
4 Yeah.

5 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: All of the
6 other line items that need adjustment --

7 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: It'll be -- it'll
8 be amended an audit and there will a price for it.

9 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: Yeah.

10 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: But it will be
11 minor.

12 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: M-hm.
13 Okay.

14 MAYOR COREY: Okay. Can we have the
15 Council read the Ordinance --

16 CITY ATTORNEY POTTS: Yeah.

17 MAYOR COREY: -- Mr. City Attorney?

18 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: I think you
19 want to do comments from citizens first, Mr.
20 Mayor.

21 MAYOR COREY: Did we not have that on
22 here?

23 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: No.

24 MAYOR COREY: Yeah, it was back up
25 the way here.

1 Citizens. I know -- yes, Joe Kehlbeck?

2 MR. KEHLBECK: Do you want me to get
3 up?

4 MAYOR COREY: I have a list here
5 somewhere, and I'll call on everybody. It's just
6 Joe.

7 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Just Joe's on
8 there.

9 MAYOR COREY: No, is Jenny from the
10 new restaurant here? Well, I'll get that in a
11 minute.

12 MR. KEHLBECK: Joe Kehlbeck, 7812
13 Cedar Ridge Court, Prospect.

14 And my comments tonight are really in
15 follow-up to some of the comments made earlier.

16 This little piece of paper goes out once a
17 month to the citizens, and we talk about
18 transparency. This is really a -- my estimation is
19 a waste of time because all it does is show the
20 budget for the year and then where we stand
21 year-to-date on that.

22 And I would like to suggest that in an effort to
23 have transparency, we would show how many
24 dollars are spent in these different categories
25 for the pre -- that month. And then also on a

1 year-to-date basis are we on budget or at a budget
2 or behind budget. And then the mayor could also
3 look at what does the future look like, are we
4 going to target the budget for the year or are we
5 going to be over or under, some idea what's taking
6 place from the standpoint of the budget and
7 actual.

8 So that was one of my comments. I think
9 Bill's done some of that.

10 MAYOR COREY: Council comments?

11 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: It's not very
12 hard to do.

13 MR. KEHLBECK: No.

14 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: We can run it
15 right off the system.

16 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Well, and
17 it also could come off of this.

18 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Yeah.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Because
20 this has got what he's asking for on it.

21 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Yeah.

22 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: It would
23 just add at least one additional column to that.

24 MR. KEHLBECK: Budget to date.

25 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Correct.

1 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Yeah.

2 Exactly.

3 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: Okay.

4 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: And the
5 one month, which is --

6 MR. KEHLBECK: M-hm.

7 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: -- also on
8 here.

9 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: Right.

10 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: But we're
11 not giving it to the citizens, I think is the point.

12 MR. KEHLBECK: I think the citizens --

13 MAYOR COREY: We can do that. Give
14 us a month to get our feet wet and know what
15 we're looking for.

16 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Joe, it's --
17 Joe, it's not very hard to do. I think we -- I know
18 what you're talking about. It's pretty easy to do.

19 MR. KEHLBECK: It is. It's just a case
20 of sitting down and -- now we've got a budget for
21 the year and it's a case of laying out by month the
22 actual and then measuring against that as we go
23 through the year.

24 MAYOR COREY: Okay

25 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: I think

1 ideally, Joe, the work you're doing on the
2 augmented web page, that would be a nice section
3 to add to that, so that people could just go on the
4 web and see that same information.

5 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Actually,
6 we -- we are talking definitely about doing that.
7 That and getting the ordinances up online are
8 probably Joe's and my favorite things.

9 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: My, we are a
10 strange group, aren't we? We talk about our
11 favorite things.

12 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Yeah.
13 Instead of chocolate cake.

14 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Yeah. Right.

15 MAYOR COREY: Any other citizen
16 comments?

17 AUDIENCE: [no response]

18 MAYOR COREY: Okay. Now, we'll get
19 down to what has been the most important thing for
20 me in what time I've been here, the second reading
21 of Ordinance Number 526 in regard to the budget
22 for the General Fund.

23 Volunteer on 526?

24 COUNCIL MEMBER SCOTT: I'll do it for
25 you.

1 MAYOR COREY: Thank you.

2 COUNCIL MEMBER SCOTT: An
3 Ordinance Establishing a Budget for the General
4 Fund of the City of Prospect for the Fiscal Year
5 Beginning July the 1st, 2013, and ending June 30th,
6 2014.

7 Now how much of this do I read?

8 CITY ATTORNEY POTTS: Be it ordained
9 and then the section and you just need to read the
10 total revenues --

11 COUNCIL MEMBER SCOTT: Okay.

12 CITY ATTORNEY POTTS: -- and the
13 total.

14 COUNCIL MEMBER SCOTT: All right.

15 [reads] Section 1: The Budget for the General
16 Fund of the City of Prospect for the Fiscal Year
17 beginning July 1st, 2013 and ending June 30th,
18 2014, shall be as follows:

19 Revenues, \$2,986,050; Expenditures, two
20 million nine hundred eighty-six dollars and fifty
21 dollars -- I mean, \$2,986,050.

22 I'm usually not used to reading those kind of
23 numbers.

24 CITY ATTORNEY POTTS: Read -- read
25 Section 2, too, if you will. please.

1 COUNCIL MEMBER SCOTT: All right.

2 [reads] Section 2: This Ordinance shall be
3 effective from and after its passage, approval and
4 publication as required by law.

5 MAYOR COREY: Does that got it?

6 CITY ATTORNEY POTTS: Yeah.

7 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Does he
8 have to read the "Be it ordained by the City of
9 Pro --

10 CITY ATTORNEY POTTS: He did.

11 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: He did, okay.

12 MAYOR COREY: Okay. Having read it
13 for the second time, all in favor?

14 CITY ATTORNEY POTTS: No; you need
15 discussion.

16 MAYOR COREY: Oh.

17 CITY ATTORNEY POTTS: If there is any.

18 MAYOR COREY: Any discussion?

19 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: I was
20 just --

21 MAYOR COREY: I think we've talked --

22 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Just --
23 just a question. All we have in front of us is the
24 actual ordinance with the global figures. In order
25 to get to the global figures, am I to understand

1 that all of the preliminary information that we
2 received has not been changed dramatically; in
3 other words, that the individual line items are as
4 they were when we agreed to them before?

5 MAYOR COREY: Far as I know, exactly.

6 CITY ADMINISTRATOR SIMMS: We
7 haven't changed anything.

8 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: That's my
9 only question.

10 MAYOR COREY: Okay.

11 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: I
12 appreciate that.

13 MAYOR COREY: Call for a vote now?

14 CITY ATTORNEY POTTS: [no audible
15 response]

16 MAYOR COREY: Okay.

17 CITY ATTORNEY POTTS: Unless there's
18 further discussion.

19 MAYOR COREY: Anybody else?

20 COUNCIL MEMBERS: [no response]

21 MAYOR COREY: Okay. We're looking at
22 Ordinance 526 in regard to the budget for the
23 General Fund for a motion --

24 CITY ATTORNEY POTTS: Roll call.

25 MAYOR COREY: -- to pass.

1 CITY ATTORNEY POTTS: Roll call.

2 MAYOR COREY: Okay.

3 MS. TUCCI: Do you need a roll call for
4 that?

5 CITY ATTORNEY POTTS: You need a
6 motion to pass. Yeah.

7 MAYOR COREY: Motion to pass?
8 Somebody?

9 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: So moved

10 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Second.

11 MAYOR COREY: Done. Ms. Tucci?

12 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Yes.

13 MAYOR COREY: Mr. Miles?

14 MR. MILES: Yes.

15 MAYOR COREY: Mr. Brab?

16 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Yes.

17 MAYOR COREY: Mr. Bowling?

18 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: Yes.

19 MAYOR COREY: Mr. Scott?

20 COUNCIL MEMBER SCOTT: Yes.

21 MAYOR COREY: And, Ms. Leonard?

22 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Yes.

23 MAYOR COREY: All righty. Volunteer to
24 read Ordinance 527 in regard to the budgets.

25 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: I'll do it.

1 MAYOR COREY: Municipal Road Aid.

2 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: I'll do it.

3 MAYOR COREY: Thank you.

4 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: [reads] An

5 Ordinance Establishing a Budget for the Municipal

6 Road Fu -- Aid Fund of the City of Prospect for the

7 Fiscal Year Beginning July 1, 2013 and Ending

8 July [sic] three -- 30th, two thousand --

9 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: June.

10 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- fourteen --

11 June four -- 30, of 2014.

12 Be it ordained by the City of Prospect,

13 Kentucky:

14 Section 1: The Budget for the Municipal Road

15 Aid Fund of the City of Prospect for the Fiscal

16 Year beginning July 1, 2013 and ending July --

17 June 30th, 2014 shall be as follows:

18 Estimated Balance July 1, 2013, \$416,019.03;

19 Estimated Increases to Fund, \$115,200; Total

20 Available for Appropriation, \$531,219.03;

21 Estimated Expenditures, Road

22 Construction/Paving, \$62,288.92, which is the

23 remainder of contract amount for Putney Pond

24 roadway; Estimated Ending Balance June 30th,

25 2014, \$468,930.11.

1 Section 2: This Ordinance shall be effective
2 for and after its passage, approval and publication
3 as required by law.

4 MAYOR COREY: Discussion?

5 MR. MILES: You can tell Bill is used to
6 talking about those big numbers, unlike Mike.

7 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: No. Just
8 a question.

9 MAYOR COREY: Yes, ma'am.

10 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: I love
11 that you gave us the streets that were going to get
12 paved this time. Would you anticipate doing that
13 in the future? And since we have not approved
14 any expenditures out of this fund, except for
15 Putney Pond, would you anticipate bringing any
16 expenditures in front of us at some future point in
17 time?

18 MAYOR COREY: Sure. Anytime I spend
19 money, you're going to know it. I mean, the only
20 thing I've spent was \$14 to the Circuit Clerk, and I
21 don't know what else to --

22 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: That's --

23 MAYOR COREY: -- release --

24 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: -- would
25 be okay.

1 MAYOR COREY: -- some property liens.

2 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: That's
3 okay. The only thing that -- this doesn't show that
4 we're appropriating anything.

5 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: That's
6 correct.

7 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: And, in
8 all honesty, small appropriations don't concern
9 me. But if we're going to start talking about large
10 appropriations, I'd like to see them.

11 MAYOR COREY: Okay. The only thing I
12 did was that paving when we had Flynn Brothers
13 here last month.

14 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: That
15 was -- that was terrific.

16 MAYOR COREY: They have called us and
17 said, "There is one street that we missed," and it
18 would be an extra \$5,000. And I asked for an
19 extra 10%, so we got plenty of money to cover it.

20 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: That's
21 great.

22 MAYOR COREY: And how did he find out
23 about that street? Did he find it or somebody
24 called him?

25 CITY ADMINISTRATOR SIMMS: He found

1 it. He found that area. And he --

2 MAYOR COREY: Tell us where it is.

3 CITY ADMINISTRATOR SIMMS: It --

4 Forest Cove Place, I believe is the one it is. And
5 he said it was the only one that had not yet been
6 paved recently, and he thought it might be a good
7 idea to go ahead do it. And I believe the cost was
8 \$3200, but I'm not --

9 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: No.

10 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: I think
11 that's great.

12 CITY ADMINISTRATOR SIMMS: It -- it --

13 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: I think
14 that's --

15 CITY ADMINISTRATOR SIMMS: -- he --
16 he --

17 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: --
18 wonderful, we're starting to do that.

19 CITY ADMINISTRATOR SIMMS: What I
20 like is that the document --

21 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: That's
22 true.

23 CITY ADMINISTRATOR SIMMS: -- really
24 basically shows us what we probably have to do
25 next year --

1 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: M-hm.

2 CITY ADMINISTRATOR SIMMS: -- unless
3 something strange would come up, at which point
4 then we'd say, "Okay. This is what he's
5 recommending this year. This is what we'd like to
6 do with the munic -- municipal road aid."

7 We won't really know until next year.

8 But if he can keep adding to that document --

9 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: That was
10 great.

11 CITY ADMINISTRATOR SIMMS: -- as
12 long as that company has the metro contract --

13 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: M-hm.

14 CITY ADMINISTRATOR SIMMS: -- it will
15 make keeping track here --

16 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: A whole
17 lot easier.

18 CITY ADMINISTRATOR SIMMS: -- much
19 easier.

20 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD:
21 Absolutely.

22 CITY ADMINISTRATOR SIMMS: And
23 we'll be able to go back and --

24 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: In -- in --

25 CITY ADMINISTRATOR SIMMS: -- track.

1 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- in effect,
2 this is just a balance. What we talked about at the
3 last meeting was the actual details that was
4 provided by --

5 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Right.

6 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- Flynn
7 Brothers.

8 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: But -- but
9 a budget --

10 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: We haven't
11 voted on the approval yet. But those --

12 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Right.

13 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- were the
14 only details we talked about.

15 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: But
16 actually, a budget usually shows appropriations.
17 And this one, obviously, doesn't. And that's my
18 only thought is, at the point in time appropriations
19 come forward, we should take another vote.

20 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: I think the
21 budget does have road aid [phonetic].

22 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: No. The
23 road aid only has the Putney Pond expenditure on
24 it.

25 CITY ADMINISTRATOR SIMMS: That's --

1 that's the only thing for the year; right?

2 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Right.

3 MAYOR COREY: That's just the money
4 coming in and what we available to spend --

5 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Right.

6 MAYOR COREY: -- not the -- not where
7 we're going to be spend it.

8 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Right.

9 COUNCIL MEMBER SCOTT: Yeah. And
10 we will see that, Mayor, when that comes up, if
11 there's, you know --

12 MAYOR COREY: Sure.

13 COUNCIL MEMBER SCOTT: -- we've got
14 another list of roads to be paved. We'll talk about
15 it and review it and be aware of it.

16 CITY ADMINISTRATOR SIMMS: And in
17 the spring you'll be able to compare what we see
18 next spring with the list they gave us this year --

19 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD:
20 Absolutely.

21 CITY ADMINISTRATOR SIMMS: -- and
22 see --

23 MAYOR COREY: See, when the --

24 CITY ADMINISTRATOR SIMMS: -- how
25 well that went. That will come to you --

1 MAYOR COREY: When the budget was
2 proposed, we didn't have Flynn Brothers. That
3 came a month later.

4 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Exactly.

5 MAYOR COREY: And that guy is a
6 delight to work with --

7 CITY ADMINISTRATOR SIMMS: Oh, yes.

8 MAYOR COREY: -- from last year.

9 CITY ADMINISTRATOR SIMMS: I've
10 never met anyone like that. He's really good.

11 MAYOR COREY: Any further discussion
12 on 527, folks?

13 COUNCIL MEMBERS: [no response]

14 MAYOR COREY: Motion to accept that as
15 an Ordinance?

16 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: So moved.

17 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Second.

18 MAYOR COREY: All right. Ms. Tuc --
19 oh, I go the other way.

20 Ms. Leonard?

21 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Yes.

22 MAYOR COREY: Mr. Scott?

23 COUNCIL MEMBER SCOTT: Yes.

24 MAYOR COREY: Mr. Bowling?

25 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: Yes.

1 MAYOR COREY: Mr. Brab?

2 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Yes.

3 MAYOR COREY: Dr. Miles?

4 MR. MILES: Yes.

5 MAYOR COREY: Ms. Tucci?

6 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Yes.

7 MAYOR COREY: It's all passed; 6-0.

8 Volunteer to read 528? I'd do it, but our city
9 attorney tells me I can't.

10 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Read it

11 Sandy, you're. . .

12 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: [reads] City
13 of Prospect, Ordinance Number 528, Series 2013,
14 An Ordinance Establishing an Ad Valorem Tax Rate
15 for the City of Prospect.

16 Be it ordained by the City of Prospect,
17 Kentucky:

18 How much of this do I have to do? All of it?

19 CITY ATTORNEY POTTS: All of it.

20 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Okay.

21 [reads] Section 1: An ad valorem tax is
22 hereby levied and fixed at the rate of 21.25 cents
23 on each \$100 of all the real estate property within
24 the corporate limits of the City of Prospect, as
25 assessed for taxation and subject to taxation by

1 said City, under assessment as of January 1st of
2 each year.

3 Section 2: Said ad valorem taxes shall be due
4 and payable, including interest and penalty,
5 pursuant to Ordinance 113, Series 1983, until paid
6 in full.

7 Section 3: The proceeds of such taxes,
8 penalties and interest are to be placed in the
9 General Fund of the City of Prospect and are to be
10 used for the general operation expenses of said
11 City, including, but not limited to, purchase of City
12 supplies, safety and security, health and
13 sanitation, recreation and welfare, improvement
14 and maintenance of streets, management and
15 maintenance of trees and public lands, garbage
16 collection, street lights and expenses thereof,
17 other expenses for operation of the City and all
18 necessary and proper municipal functions as may
19 be ordained and resolved by the City Council.

20 That's a nice summary of what we do around
21 here.

22 [reads] Section 4: This Ordinance shall be
23 effective from and after its passage, approval, and
24 publication as required by law.

25 MAYOR COREY: Discussion?

1 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: There's no
2 change.

3 COUNCIL MEMBER SCOTT: Right.
4 That's the same rate we pay.

5 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Pay rate.

6 MAYOR COREY: Yes, sir.

7 COUNCIL MEMBER SCOTT: Right.

8 MAYOR COREY: And I found out today
9 that we're relatively low. I got the Kentucky
10 League of Cities Report in, and most everybody is
11 at least 22.1. We're still way down. And we're --
12 we're doing well. We don't have any debt to
13 service. And I think we'll go over budget this
14 year.

15 Okay. Motion to accept that and make it an
16 ordinance?

17 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: So
18 moved.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Second.

20 MAYOR COREY: All righty. Now we'll go
21 to the other end. Ms. Tucci?

22 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Yes.

23 MAYOR COREY: Dr. Miles?

24 MR. MILES: Yes.

25 MAYOR COREY: Mr. Brab?

1 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Yes.

2 MAYOR COREY: Mr. Bowling?

3 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: Yes.

4 MAYOR COREY: Mr. Scott?

5 COUNCIL MEMBER SCOTT: Yes.

6 MAYOR COREY: Ms. Leonard?

7 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Yes.

8 MAYOR COREY: All righty. That one's
9 passed. So thank goodness.

10 I came in cold. And all of a sudden, I realized
11 Todd was very computer literate and kept all that
12 stuff in a manner in which he could find it; I
13 couldn't. And without Ann Simms, I'd have never
14 had made that thing through. That was a lot of
15 midnight candle.

16 Pass those down guys, if you will. This is --
17 and we'll get more discussion here in a minute.
18 Here's. . . .

19 That's a creek bed crossing down in Harrod's
20 Creek Park. And Stuart has appropriately said
21 that he would like to put something across that
22 when the water is running. It's not -- I mean,
23 you've got to walk through that creek. And it will
24 cost about \$3700.

25 Thanks to Linda Wardell, we just got another

1 \$2,500 back.

2 Then the question was: Do we want to
3 handrail on the -- is it rocks that will be across
4 there?

5 MR. MILES: Yeah. What they're going to
6 do is, if you've seen the stone steps that we have
7 going down to Harrod's Creek Park, there's a
8 stream crossing that you come across. Joe, you're
9 familiar --

10 MAYOR COREY: You guys --

11 MR. MILES: -- with that.

12 MAYOR COREY: -- want to pass these
13 around.

14 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: And it's --
15 it's really tricky. It's basically, you're walking
16 down a mud bank and across uneven surfaces in
17 the stream. The stream doesn't run that often, and
18 when it does, it doesn't run that high. So the
19 water isn't the main issue. The main issue is
20 getting down the bank on both sides.

21 So what this would do is it would create two or
22 three stone steps down into the creek, and they
23 would use the natural creek stone to create a level
24 surface going across the creek with -- with a way
25 for the water to go under the stones they lay

1 across there. There wouldn't be a bridge, per se,
2 but you don't need a bridge across this; you just
3 need a -- a safe way to get in and out of the -- the
4 streambed.

5 And I suggested, even though, by code, you
6 don't need a handrail, I asked him to give me a bid
7 to add a handrail on both sides. Because I just
8 think to air on the side of caution, to add that to
9 it. And -- and he didn't feel that would add, you
10 know, much to this bid. So it's basically going to
11 be \$3700 plus a little bit extra for a handrail on
12 both sides.

13 MAYOR COREY: Now --

14 MR. MILES: And --

15 MAYOR COREY: -- I've got --

16 MR. MILES: -- and I --

17 MAYOR COREY: -- the authority to order
18 that, but I want to put it out to you-all. Has
19 anybody got any strong feelings against it?

20 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: I like the
21 idea of the handrail. That's a long way for EMS to
22 carry somebody out if she breaks her ankle, as she
23 has done many times. It's good to have handrails
24 for.

25 MAYOR COREY: It's a good thing.

1 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Right.

2 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: M-hm.

3 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: And what --

4 and what -- and what this does is, it real -- that's
5 just something we jerry-rigged to -- to make
6 across.

7 And -- and I have had several people comment
8 to me, who I see back there, that the trail is so, so
9 accessible, except when you cross that first
10 stream crossing. So this is something that
11 residents have asked me about. I tend to be the
12 person who gets these phone calls because they
13 know I'm involved in it.

14 And then I think, for the money, it's -- it's a
15 great deal, and -- and it will open the park up to
16 several more folks who right now would get to that
17 point, turn around, and walk back up the hill.

18 MAYOR COREY: Unless I've got four
19 people against it, I'm going to go ahead --

20 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Now --

21 MAYOR COREY: -- with it.

22 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: --

23 since --

24 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: I've got

25 a --

1 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: -- since
2 Ms. Ward --

3 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: -- quick
4 question.

5 MAYOR COREY: Yes, sir.

6 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: I do, too.

7 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: Go
8 ahead.

9 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: My
10 question was: Are we taking out this year's money
11 or the money that we just --

12 MR. MILES: It wouldn't be done until
13 next year, so it would be next year's money.

14 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: But the
15 \$2,500 that she's saved us is this year's money.
16 Is there any way we can use that?

17 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: This year's
18 money --

19 MR. MILES: Are they --

20 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- only if it
21 gets --

22 MR. MILES: -- are they going to be
23 mailing us a check?

24 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- only if it
25 gets -- only if it gets back here by the --

1 MAYOR COREY: Yeah.

2 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: He was
3 [phonetic] already paid. You're right.

4 MS. WARDELL: Yeah, we won't. . .

5 MAYOR COREY: Yes, Linda.

6 MS. WARDELL: Yes. I'll -- I'll just
7 explain this a little bit. The City paid in the
8 \$2,500 in March, when the archeological survey
9 was done. I discovered it two days ago. So today,
10 Mayor Corey signed a request to reimburse. That
11 money is not going to get here until next year. So
12 it -- there is --

13 MAYOR COREY: Next fiscal year.

14 MS. WARDELL: Next fiscal year. So
15 there is a disconnect between expenses this year
16 and next year. But I would argue that because this
17 sent found money, it ought to be designated to go
18 to parks.

19 MAYOR COREY: Yeah.

20 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Sounds
21 fair.

22 MAYOR COREY: I fully agree.

23 MS. WARDELL: And that's -- that's all I
24 have.

25 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: So it would

1 just be added to our current park budget that we
2 have going for next year.

3 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: And then
4 the whole expense would come --

5 MR. MILES: Will come out of there.

6 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: That
7 makes sense.

8 MAYOR COREY: And we can always
9 amend this budget later on down the line to put a
10 category for parks in there. I mean, we --

11 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Well,
12 there -- there is --

13 MAYOR COREY: -- Stuart is a --

14 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: --
15 some --

16 MAYOR COREY: -- reasonable man.

17 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: Stuart,
18 I -- I know the Scouts can't do stones and rock.
19 But if we did the -- the cedar bridges like we have
20 in other places there, is that something they could
21 do there or you just don't think that would work?

22 MR. MILES: No. The ga -- it's -- it's
23 beyond their capabilities.

24 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: Okay.

25 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: They can

1 cover a span of about eight to ten feet.

2 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: I see.

3 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: And then it
4 gets into --

5 MAYOR COREY: Thank you, Ms. Wardell.

6 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: -- and that
7 other of kind of stuff.

8 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: Gotcha.

9 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: But there are
10 -- there are -- we have so many Scout projects in
11 both parks now that we're going to keep them busy
12 with -- with those. But -- and you're right. My
13 first is always to give them that opportunity.

14 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: Right.

15 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: But that was
16 beyond their capability.

17 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: Gotcha.

18 Okay.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER SCOTT: My only
20 question: I know it's not a great deal of money,
21 but do you ever go out to get another bid or you
22 just go with the person you use or --

23 MR. MILES: I've --

24 COUNCIL MEMBER SCOTT: -- what's
25 the --

1 MR. MILES: -- I've used this Third Rock
2 before. And we didn't get a competitive bid on this
3 small project, but they -- they do such good work.
4 They're a -- a company that has been around for a
5 long time. They're bonded.

6 You know, for something like this, I just -- I
7 think -- in my own personal life, I like to use a
8 bigger company that I know is going to stand
9 behind their work. They've done other work for us
10 before, and when -- they actually came back and
11 found something they didn't like, and they're
12 come -- come [sic] back and fix it. So they're just
13 a really good company, very reputable.

14 And for a project like this, being -- again, I
15 know it's three -- \$3700. I don't want to say it's
16 not a lot of money, but in the grand scheme of
17 things, for these types of projects, it's a very
18 small project.

19 MAYOR COREY: And for the audience,
20 we don't have to put things out for bids unless
21 they hit 20,000?

22 CITY ATTORNEY POTTS: Yeah.

23 MAYOR COREY: So, you know, \$3700 is
24 not something we advertise that -- that kind of
25 stuff.

1 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: And
2 they're -- they -- they specialize in getting into
3 these areas and not disturbing them. Because
4 they're going to have to bring equipment back
5 there. And they've -- they've done that for us
6 before, and when they're done, it's like they
7 weren't even there before. And, you know, again,
8 another company might do it cheaper, but what's
9 the area going to look like?

10 COUNCIL MEMBER SCOTT: I -- I realize
11 the amount is not significant.

12 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Oh. No. But
13 it's a good question.

14 COUNCIL MEMBER SCOTT: I was just --

15 MR. MILES: It's a very good --

16 COUNCIL MEMBER SCOTT: -- curious.

17 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: -- question.

18 COUNCIL MEMBER SCOTT: Thanks.

19 MAYOR COREY: Ann just reminded me,
20 if we just advertise it in the paper that we're
21 putting out something for bids, it's about \$2,000
22 just to put it in the paper.

23 COUNCIL MEMBER SCOTT: Well, that
24 kind of --

25 MAYOR COREY: It's amazing.

1 COUNCIL MEMBER SCOTT: -- answers
2 the question, doesn't it?

3 MAYOR COREY: Okay. Do I have four
4 votes against it? Otherwise, I'm going to say go.

5 COUNCIL MEMBERS: [no response]

6 MAYOR COREY: Go.

7 Now, Mayor's comments. This place is a
8 wonderful place. And I worry about the welfare of
9 this little town a lot. Too much. Don't have the
10 time nor the stamina.

11 Our people out there, the three people who
12 work out there -- unfortunately, the police
13 department is on 24/7. But besides Ann and I,
14 there's three people out there.

15 On July 4th they're going to be there earlier in
16 the morning, and they're going to be there late at
17 night. They set up chairs; they pick up trash; they
18 do that kind of stuff. This year 4th of July falls on
19 a Thursday. Most people are going to make that a
20 long weekend. I'd like to close the office July 5th,
21 because they're going to be pooped, beat, and
22 wore out anyway from the 4th, those three people.

23 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Sounds
24 like a --

25 MAYOR COREY: Can I give them --

1 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: -- a great
2 idea.

3 MAYOR COREY: -- the okay?

4 COUNCIL MEMBER SCOTT: Yeah.
5 Sounds like a wonderful idea.

6 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Yes.

7 MAYOR COREY: Okay. We're done.

8 Now, to the Peyton Place part of it. I put out
9 an email blast because I told Ron to put Bill Brab's
10 name on that first traffic thing. And then I said
11 put Bill Brab's name on that second traffic thing.
12 And this is not stuff with Brab, because he's a --
13 he's worked hard right here in this room with
14 that -- those highway people, who are very nice
15 people, but they're very hardheaded, a long time.

16 Any -- you-all are the elected folks of this
17 town. Now, if you've got an article that is
18 informative, educational, or amusing, give it to me
19 and put your name on it. That's not political
20 fodder. I would say that if it's after the fo -- filing
21 deadline, and there are other candidates for
22 Council, then we cut it off then, so that we don't
23 have to give equal time to other candidates. But
24 in the meantime, until there's a filing deadline,
25 good gracious, folks, go to it. And if you write

1 something, I'll print it, as long as it's not nasty.

2 Now, more Peyton Place.

3 MR. SPEAKER: Twice he said not to.

4 MAYOR COREY: I get all kinds of stuff
5 here, you know, skunks and dog poop and tall
6 grass.

7 And I get this stuff, I heard you made a deal
8 with Brab that if he would get you in as mayor,
9 you'd get him in later.

10 In my work life, I have seen Mike Scott more
11 than I have Bill Brab, even though he lives two
12 houses away. They're long houses. No. There
13 were no deals made by anybody, anywhere.
14 Somebody's looking for boogers in the attic. We
15 don't have any boogers. We don't have an attic.
16 And it ain't so.

17 So, you know, I'm not going to stay very long.
18 I've told -- for you folks out there, I've told these
19 people out -- up here, you-all elected them. I'm
20 here because they were -- they have seen the
21 futility of three of six running for mayor when you
22 need four votes. And I think the night I was
23 elected, correct me if I'm wrong, there was 36
24 hours left before you folks lost the --

25 MR. MILES: M-hm.

1 MAYOR COREY: -- authority to do it. It
2 was going to go to Frankfort. Statute says the
3 governor does it. The governor doesn't do it; his
4 staff does it. Then he comes in and he's got a
5 person in charge of appointments, "Find me a
6 mayor for Prospect." Well, you know how that's --
7 goes. I mean, we might've gotten a good one, we
8 might've not have.

9 But anyway, it's time for you folks to kiss
10 and make up, forget about personal stuff, and get
11 one of you in this chair.

12 Now, anything else? Council comments?

13 MR. MILES: I think you're doing a great
14 job and you should stay until --

15 MAYOR COREY: I don't want to stay. I
16 don't have the time nor the stamina.

17 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: I second
18 Stuart's comment [phonetic].

19 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: This -- this
20 is when all the good stuff starts happening,
21 though, Ken.

22 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Ken, you --
23 you've got --

24 MAYOR COREY: Oh. She wrote me this
25 big, long email. Oh, how you're going to love it,

1 marching in the parade. I'll be sweating like a
2 little warthog.

3 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Ken -- Ken,
4 you've got to look through history. I'm a man of
5 history. And sometimes history calls to people to
6 step in and do a job.

7 MAYOR COREY: Am I growing a halo out
8 there?

9 MR. MILES: And -- and -- and it's a job
10 that maybe at this moment you don't understand
11 the importance of why it's you, and --

12 MAYOR COREY: Sounds like mamaw.

13 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: -- and it is
14 you.

15 And -- and I've got to say, I'm -- I'm speaking
16 from my heart, you are going at that great job.
17 You're exactly what this city needs. And I -- I --
18 you know, I think you need to stay in this job
19 because you're the right man for the right time.

20 MAYOR COREY: Oh. Thank you, Stuart.

21 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Agreed.

22 MAYOR COREY: Thank you very much.

23 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Does
24 anybody.

25 MAYOR COREY: Thank all --

1 MR. MILES: -- disagree --

2 MAYOR COREY: -- of you.

3 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: -- up here
4 with that statement?

5 COUNCIL MEMBER SCOTT: No. I'll --
6 I'll second it.

7 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: That's
8 something -- that's one thing this Council --

9 MR. MILES: And -- and --

10 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: -- can really
11 be unanimous about --

12 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: That's
13 right. You can take vote on that one.

14 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: And we all
15 agree on that.

16 MAYOR COREY: All right. Let's get the
17 ball rolling. Be unanimous. You-all haven't been
18 non-unanimous about anything since I've been
19 here. Thank you all very much.

20 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: All right. So
21 let's don't screw it up. And. . .

22 MAYOR COREY: Okay. Anything else for
23 new business, old business, any of the citizens
24 what to add anything?

25 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: I just want to

1 say one thing: If you-all are not on the
2 Kentucky/Indiana Bridges Website, please get on
3 it. If you are not on the email list for the City of
4 Prospect's email blast, please get on it. Tell all
5 your neighbors.

6 The blasting starts shortly, like, in a
7 week-and-a-half. You're going to have Prospect,
8 basically traffic stopped, anywhere from 5 to 20
9 minutes every time there's a blast going on down
10 through the tunnel and everything.

11 CHIEF SHERRARD: Be on the high side,
12 I would say. Close --

13 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: I would say
14 it'd be closer --

15 CHIEF SHERRARD: -- I would say --

16 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- to 20
17 minutes.

18 CHIEF SHERRARD: -- it's going to be
19 closer to 20 than it is 5.

20 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: And you're
21 going to see major back ups. And --

22 CHIEF SHERRARD: Particularly --

23 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- we're
24 trying to just give you the information in these
25 emails. But I am not hopeful that it's going to go

1 smoothly. That's all I'm going to say. But please
2 get on those email lists, if you're not, because it's
3 very, very important.

4 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Have we
5 given them permission to use Timber Ridge?

6 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: To do what?

7 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Use
8 Timber Ridge.

9 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: We can't stop
10 them.

11 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Well, I
12 understand that. But have we blessed it in any
13 way, shape --

14 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: We have --

15 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: -- or
16 form?

17 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- we have --
18 we have simply said that they have requested it.

19 The two things that we can do, as my
20 understanding, is that we can control its speed
21 limit and we can control --

22 CHIEF SHERRARD: The weight.

23 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- the weight.

24 And the core drilling has been done on the road,
25 and the road will support the weight of those

1 trucks. So we can control the speed limit.

2 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: I figure
3 Kroger's gas station will also get into that at the
4 same time. It's going to be pretty interesting.

5 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Well, the --
6 the -- the main thing we have to deal with is what's
7 going to back up here on River Road. It -- it's --
8 it's -- this blasting -- it -- it -- for those of you
9 who didn't go to the meetings, the blast site has to
10 be cleared for 800 feet in all directions. Go to the
11 corner of 42 and 841 and try and figure out what
12 800 feet is. It's going to stop everything.

13 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Yeah. It is
14 going to stop until it gets --

15 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: A total --

16 MR. MILES: -- 1,000 feet, and I'm not
17 sure, how far is the total tunnel?

18 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: The tunnel --
19 the tunnel stops at the other side of Drumanard --

20 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Right. Do
21 we know the distance?

22 CHIEF SHERRARD: It's -- it's 1800 feet
23 long.

24 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: So actually
25 they're going to have to --

1 CHIEF SHERRARD: One side is about 75
2 feet longer than the other side.

3 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: So they're
4 going to have to get halfway through that tunnel
5 before it's far enough away where they don't have
6 to stop the traffic.

7 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Which is
8 about 16 --

9 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Well, now
10 it depends on where they take the debris out.

11 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Well, it's
12 the --

13 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Well, they'll
14 only take it out at this end.

15 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Right. But
16 it's the blasting that they're -- it's from the
17 blasting.

18 MR. KEHLBECK: Will they put a stop --

19 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: But
20 they're also going to stop traffic to bring their
21 trucks of debris out. It's -- it's going to be pretty
22 interesting.

23 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Yeah. It'll
24 be a mess. It doesn't matter.

25 MR. KEHLBECK: Will they put a

1 stoplight up over on River Road at the end of --

2 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: They'll be --

3 MR. KEHLBECK: -- Timber Ridge?

4 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- they'll be
5 actually --

6 CHIEF SHERRARD: Two.

7 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- two

8 stoplights on River Road. . .

9 CHIEF SHERRARD: But not necessarily
10 at Timber Ridge?

11 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: But not at
12 Timber Ridge --

13 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Right.

14 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- yet.

15 CHIEF SHERRARD: Yeah.

16 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Yet. So. . .

17 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: The only
18 good news about this is, I think most of us here
19 can remember that at one point the bridge route
20 would have gone right through the Kroger shopping
21 center. And that would have been a permanent
22 tearing apart of the city.

23 We're talking about something that will be
24 really miserable for a couple of years, and that's a
25 long time, but it isn't forever. The original route

1 would have been forever.

2 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: That's
3 true.

4 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: But, please,
5 get on those websites. That's the only thing I can
6 say.

7 I got an email from Kentucky/India Bridge --
8 Indiana Bridges tonight before this meeting, so
9 they're very prompt on those things.

10 MAYOR COREY: Anything further,
11 anybody?

12 COUNCIL MEMBERS: [no response]

13 AUDIENCE: [no response]

14 MAYOR COREY: Anywhere?

15 COUNCIL MEMBERS: [no response]

16 AUDIENCE: [no response]

17 MAYOR COREY: Motion?

18 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Move to
19 adjourn.

20 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: Second.

21 MAYOR COREY: So ordered. All in
22 favor.

23 COUNCIL MEMBERS: Aye.

24 MAYOR COREY: Okay.
