2 CITY COUNCIL MEETING  
3 NOVEMBER 17, 2014

4 MAYOR EVANS: Meeting will please  
5 come to order.

6 This is the City of Prospect City Council  
7 Meeting of November 17, 2014. And the first order  
8 of business on the agenda -- well, first of all, I'd  
9 like to note that all six members of the council are  
10 present.

11 First order of business on the agenda is the --  
12 are the minutes of the last previous meeting held  
13 on October 20, 2014. Those minutes were sent to  
14 all the members of the Council for their review.  
15 Accordingly, does anyone on the Council have a  
16 motion pertaining to those minutes?

17 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: Move to  
18 accept.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: Second.

20 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Second.

21 MAYOR EVANS: There's movement and  
22 seconded that they be accepted as written. Any  
23 discussion?

24 COUNCIL MEMBERS: [no response]

25 MAYOR EVANS: If not, we'll go to a

1 vote. All in favor, say, "Aye."

2 COUNCIL MEMBERS: Aye.

3 MAYOR EVANS: Those opposed?

4 COUNCIL MEMBERS: [no response]

5 MAYOR EVANS: The ayes have it. The  
6 minutes are approved as written.

7 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: I'd also  
8 like to note that the minutes look really good and  
9 they're very easy to read the way they've been  
10 formatted. And whoever does it, we should say  
11 thank you to them.

12 MAYOR EVANS: I appreciate your saying  
13 so, and I would like to tell you who does the  
14 minutes. Her name is Laura Taylor. She is one of  
15 our two receptionists. She is superb at doing -- at  
16 just writing the English language, and she does a  
17 very good job --

18 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: M-hm.

19 MAYOR EVANS: -- of going through the  
20 transcripts and presenting minutes.

21 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: And  
22 then --

23 MAYOR EVANS: I hardly ever --

24 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: -- picking  
25 out the --

1 MAYOR EVANS: -- have to --

2 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: -- salient  
3 things.

4 MAYOR EVANS: -- correct anything.

5 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Yeah.

6 It -- it -- really, they are very --

7 MAYOR EVANS: I'm glad --

8 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: -- good.

9 THE WITNESS: -- you mentioned that.

10 Mayor's update on City matters. Probably the  
11 least important thing I have to tell you is an  
12 experience I had this morning. I got to ride in the  
13 snowplow. Our dutied police officer failed to call  
14 Bob Kurtsinger, our -- our snow contractor, as he  
15 was supposed to do. And when I looked out the  
16 window at 4:30 and saw what was going on, I got  
17 concerned enough to get dressed and come down  
18 here.

19 And I called Kurtsinger and he was on his  
20 way. And he had another truck sitting out here.  
21 Somebody had come and started it, was warming it  
22 up. Well, I got to help plow the streets this  
23 morning. And --

24 MR. KEHLBECK: Good job.

25 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Did he let

1 you drive the truck?

2 MAYOR EVANS: No. He didn't -- he  
3 didn't go that far. And I -- I think he was wise.

4 Anyway, that was an interesting experience,  
5 and one that you might want to try one of these  
6 days because I suspect we're going to have more  
7 of it.

8 In important business, we have three  
9 contracts put together to replace the existing  
10 landscape contract with Edwards. We have had a  
11 discussion about this with Bob Kurtsinger. He, of  
12 course, is free to bid on any or all of these new  
13 contracts. The reason that we have three is that  
14 the current contract tries to be all things to all  
15 people. In the landscaping area, it covers both --  
16 well, not both, it covers mowing, it covers  
17 landscaping services, gardening services, it  
18 covers the application of pesticides and  
19 fertilizers, and it also covers snow removal. So  
20 it's just this big bundle of all these things in --in  
21 one document, and it was written long time ago.

22 What we are proposing to do here is to put out  
23 one contract for mowing and another contract for  
24 landscaping and gardening services of all sorts.  
25 And this is from something as simple as mulching

1 to the pruning of the different shrubs, the  
2 choosing of flowers and the caring for all the  
3 landscaping, whatever it may be. And the last  
4 one, the pesticide and fertilizers, takes someone  
5 who has more knowledge than the average person  
6 of when it is appropriate to apply these things and  
7 what it is that should be applied. Some expertise  
8 is required here. And so we are doing all three of  
9 these things.

10 It's possible that one company will win the bid  
11 on all three. More likely, it would seem to me, one  
12 company could win the mowing, another company  
13 could win the landscaping and gardening, and who  
14 knows who would get the fertilizing and pesticides.

15 But those will go out, probably, in about a  
16 week. The delay is because I would like the  
17 members of the Landscape Committee to look them  
18 over. For example, Sherry Wehr is on the  
19 Landscape Committee and she lives up in the  
20 Estates of Hunting Creek, and she's very  
21 concerned about how the islands up there are  
22 maintained. And I want her to with see the --  
23 particularly the landscape gardening contract that  
24 we propose to use before we put it out on the  
25 counter for the contractors to get. So that's

1 what's going on on that.

2 The snowplowing, we're going to leave -- leave  
3 the existing contract in place until the end of  
4 February. That will get us through most of the  
5 winter. And Bob Kurtsinger has agreed that for  
6 whatever happens in March, we can just go sort of  
7 a la carte. And we will do that. And then at  
8 another month, sometime later on, we'll put out a  
9 contract for snow removal for the coming year, and  
10 that'll be a separate contract.

11 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: John, I have  
12 a question.

13 MAYOR EVANS: And I'm ready for  
14 questions.

15 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Okay. When  
16 we -- I'm -- let's assume, in a way, a worse case  
17 scenario, where you have three separate  
18 contractors, one does mowing, one does  
19 pesticides, and so forth.

20 MAYOR EVANS: That might -- that might  
21 be a best case scenario --

22 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Who will  
23 coordinate so that you don't have somebody  
24 mowing at the wrong time, right before or after the  
25 pesticide? You -- you know, somebody has to

1 coordinate some of that activity. And whose  
2 responsibility will that be?

3 When it was just Kurtsinger, then he, you  
4 know, did some sort of logical sequencing of  
5 events.

6 MAYOR EVANS: Well, perhaps he did.

7 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Well, at -- at  
8 least -- at least, in theory, he was in -- he was in  
9 a position to know all the things that were going to  
10 be happening, so. . .

11 MAYOR EVANS: Well, this is a work in  
12 progress, but I would suspect the answer to that is  
13 likely to be that Andrea Hanlon, with our  
14 cooperation, with Rob Cundiff and the rest of us,  
15 will be supervising. She has been supervising --

16 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: M-hm.

17 MAYOR EVANS: -- very, very closely  
18 ever since we hired her.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: M-hm. Yeah.

20 MAYOR EVANS: And she spends time out  
21 here that for what we pay her is hard to --

22 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: It's a  
23 bargain.

24 MAYOR EVANS: -- hard to believe.

25 That -- that -- that would be my answer --

1 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: She'd be like  
2 the contractor for us.

3 MAYOR EVANS: Yeah. Now the  
4 contracts do not specify her by name.

5 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: M-hm.

6 MAYOR EVANS: We thought it wise to,  
7 sort of, do a generic --

8 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: M-hm.

9 MAYOR EVANS: -- description of the  
10 kind of person she is.

11 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: M-hm.

12 MAYOR EVANS: You know, just so that  
13 if -- we weren't, you know, tied to that.

14 Any other questions about this --

15 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: That should  
16 be it [phonetic].

17 MAYOR EVANS: Okay. We have some  
18 personnel changes coming at us very soon. Some  
19 months ago we hired two ladies to be part-time, 20  
20 hours a week, at the front desk, and that has  
21 worked well. And we intend to continue that.

22 The problem there is that one of them has  
23 decided that part of her bucket list is to go live in  
24 Florida and, by God, she's going to do it on  
25 Thursday. So -- so Nancy is going to be leaving

1 us after this coming week.

2 And at the same time, we have a full-time  
3 employee who's been with us for many, many  
4 years; her name is Jill Vidito. She has been the  
5 police secretary all this time. And in talking with  
6 Jeff, we came to conclusion that the police really  
7 didn't need Jill upstairs full-time.

8 And at the same time that presented us with  
9 the difficult, perhaps, possibility of just telling Jill  
10 that, well, we really didn't need her full-time  
11 anymore. And then we found that we needed  
12 somebody part-time at the front desk. And it's my  
13 understanding, and, I think, Holly's, that Jill does  
14 a nice job with dealing with the public over the  
15 phone and in person, when that happens, and so  
16 she is going to take Nancy's 20 hours a week down  
17 at the front desk and spend the other 20 hours a  
18 week upstairs. And this kind of works -- it sort of  
19 a win-win, I think, solution.

20 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Yeah. So  
21 that's 20 hours a week?

22 MAYOR EVANS: Yeah. We have hired  
23 three more full -- part-time police officers, and I'm  
24 going to let Jeff Sherrard tell you about that.

25 Then I'm going to ask Holly to talk about the

1 Fall Festival that we just had, and then I'm going  
2 to ask Julia to talk about the completed audit.  
3 And then we'll move along.

4 Jeff, do you want to talk about --

5 CHIEF SHERRARD: Sure.

6 MAYOR EVANS: -- the people we've  
7 hired.

8 CHIEF SHERRARD: The first of the  
9 three that we hired was Chris Harr. I think you-all  
10 got to meet him last month. For those of you that  
11 were here at last month's meeting, we hired him at  
12 the first part of October. He's worked out well. In  
13 fact, he's out on the street right now. He was a  
14 20-year officer with Louisville Metro, was  
15 eventually promoted to sergeant and then finished  
16 out his career as a sergeant working narcotics at a  
17 district level. So he was very highly  
18 recommended, and he's working out very well.

19 On November 3rd we hired Antoinette Leitsch;  
20 she -- she goes by Toni. She was a 20-year  
21 veteran with Louisville Metro Police. She worked  
22 in the patrol divisions and eventually was a  
23 detective with the Evidence Technician Unit;  
24 worked with detectives doing that, and then the  
25 latter part of her career she was a crime with the

1 Crimes Against Children Unit. So she gives us a  
2 little bit different perspective in that.

3 And, quite honestly, that's one of those things  
4 that unless you work with that frequently, there's  
5 all kinds of new rules and things that come into  
6 play when dealing with children, whether they be  
7 suspects in a case, whether they be victims in a  
8 case. The way that you handle juveniles is  
9 completely different than the way you handle  
10 adults. So it's really good to have somebody with  
11 that expertise on board because she can actually  
12 help train us all in the way that the rules have  
13 changed over the last few years. So she's a very  
14 good asset to have.

15 And then the third person we hired was Rick  
16 Polin. Rick Polin, also, was a 20-year veteran  
17 with Louisville Metro. He served in patrol units, in  
18 the narcotics bureau, was promoted to sergeant,  
19 worked, again, as a patrol sergeant, and then most  
20 recently he was in the Public Integrity Unit, where  
21 they investigated all police-involved shootings,  
22 anything where police officers may be involved in  
23 the commission of a crime; and, also, any metro  
24 government employee that was suspected of a  
25 crime, that unit, they investigated all those. So he

1 has a lot of expertise in those iss -- in those areas  
2 that come into play. And he's supposed to be an a  
3 heck of an interrogator, if it ever gets to the point  
4 that -- that we need that for any reason, he's  
5 supposed to be very good at conducting  
6 interviews.

7 And one thing I think that you'll notice about  
8 all of them, all three of them are extremely  
9 personable; they're very friendly; they'll work very  
10 well out here; and they're all very professional.  
11 And I don't think any of those three would've failed  
12 to have made that phone call last night. That's all  
13 I'm telling you.

14 MAYOR EVANS: Well, somebody did.

15 CHIEF SHERRARD: It wasn't one of  
16 those three. The irony of that was that the officer  
17 that was called at 11:15 last night and reminded  
18 what to do when the weather got bad and he still  
19 failed to do it. So, that's obviously the issue  
20 we're dealing with.

21 MAYOR EVANS: Probably the cold  
22 weather. Okay.

23 Holly, what about the Fall Festival?

24 CITY ADMINISTRATOR LEVOLD: Well,  
25 as everybody here knows, I think just about

1 everybody was at the Fall Festival, it went really  
2 well. We had it right here in the park.

3 I think the biggest success was the haunted  
4 trail with the neighborhoods re -- representing  
5 certain areas. It was huge. Kids loved it; people  
6 loved it. We already have requests for next year  
7 to make the trail bigger and more participation.

8 And, yeah, I don't think it could've gone any  
9 better. There were a few small hiccups. But,  
10 other than that, it was really well received by  
11 everybody. And people loved the new location,  
12 that it was -- everybody could see it and join in.  
13 So, I think that it was a huge success.

14 MAYOR EVANS: I just want to say there  
15 are three people who make the Fall Festival and  
16 the Fourth of July as good as they are. And this is  
17 one of them right here; the other one is in the  
18 back, that's Julia; and the third one went home,  
19 and that's Ron Cundiff. And the three of them  
20 work together, and they have a ball doing it, and  
21 they really bring it off well. Thank you.

22 CITY ADMINISTRATOR LEVOLD: I think  
23 it was a lot of fun this year, changing it up a little  
24 bit and adding some new -- new things --

25 MAYOR EVANS: Yeah.

1 CITY ADMINISTRATOR LEVOLD: -- and  
2 keeping the good old things, and. . .

3 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Well, and  
4 we certainly liked seeing some of council people in  
5 costume. You did very well.

6 And the troll was wonderful. And that one  
7 child that played the zombie -- not a child, he's is  
8 a young man. But they -- they were fantastic.

9 MAYOR EVANS: He scared me.

10 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: They  
11 scared a lot of people.

12 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: You just  
13 didn't have Scout the zombie dog protecting you.  
14 Didn't come up at the wrong time.

15 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: That's  
16 true.

17 MAYOR EVANS: That's true. Yeah.  
18 Julia, what about the audit.

19 MS. CLORE: You want me to go up  
20 there?

21 MAYOR EVANS: Sure.

22 MS. CLORE: The audit is done and  
23 finalized, and everyone should have a copy of the  
24 final audit. And if you have any questions about  
25 it, I'd be happy to answer them. And if I can't

1 answer them, then I'll get with Bill Talley and get  
2 you an answer.

3 But the audit went really well. I learned a lot.  
4 Bill Talley is an expert, obviously, in what he does  
5 and with doing the -- Prospect's audit. The  
6 biggest change -- the most notice -- noticeable  
7 change is that, you know, we went from accrual to  
8 cash. But Bill did that seamlessly by backing out  
9 last year's insurance tax, so we have a really clear  
10 picture of what we did in that 12-month fiscal year  
11 instead of guesstimating moving forward. So, it's  
12 a lot more true.

13 And it's also what other cities do. And I think  
14 that's important, too, to kind of look at what other  
15 cities are doing and what works for them. And so  
16 our audit this year, which was -- it was really  
17 important to the mayor that we go to the cash  
18 basis -- the audit this year more resembles a city  
19 audit of other cities. That -- I think that's ki --  
20 good, too.

21 Our net position is really good. You know,  
22 everything is really good as far as our -- our  
23 bottom line.

24 So does anyone have any questions?

25 MAYOR EVANS: Julia, while you're

1       there --

2               MS. CLORE:   Yeah.

3               MAYOR EVANS:  -- this isn't a question,  
4       but would you say a word about what you've been  
5       doing as far as past entries and bringing them --  
6       or trying to bring them --

7               MS. CLORE:   Yeah.

8               MAYOR EVANS:  -- into useable form  
9       because they weren't.  Can you tell us --

10              MS. CLORE:   Right.

11              MAYOR EVANS:  -- a little about that?

12              MS. CLORE:   So just like my day-to-day,  
13       like, payables, I think that's what you. . . I have  
14       a -- a more com -- I like -- when I use QuickBooks,  
15       I use the memo lines a lot.

16              The invoice sheet that I gave you guys in your  
17       packet, those invoices sheets, I had to go back  
18       two years and actually pull paper invoices and  
19       then make the memo lines on those because  
20       writing -- you know, this is -- Invoice 11073 is not  
21       really helpful to anyone.  So what I've been doing,  
22       and you'll notice this, you know, anytime you want  
23       records, you just feel free ask.  But it'll not only  
24       have invoice number but it'll say what the services  
25       were -- were.  And, a lot of times, if it's a project

1 that was, you know, brought on by, like, Andrea  
2 Hanlon with all her great ideas with the grounds  
3 improvement, then it might say "Per Hanlon." So  
4 I'm not only making more memo -- memo lines but  
5 making who requested them and who approved  
6 them.

7 Also, just going back and trying to kind of  
8 clean that up a little bit from years before has  
9 been really difficult. But Holly is really helpful.  
10 Her knowledge of the city, I cou -- like, if I have a  
11 question about something, I can I go to her and  
12 she's like, "Oh. I remember this," and then she  
13 can direct me to minute notes, and then I can read  
14 minutes and then kind of get an idea of where  
15 things were and go from there, so. . . Is that --

16 MAYOR EVANS: Thanks for what you're  
17 doing.

18 MS. CLORE: Yeah.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Thank you.

20 MAYOR EVANS: As far as the audit is  
21 concerned, I think it'd be appropriate to have a  
22 motion and a vote on accepting the audit that we  
23 have already looked at. Is there such a motion?

24 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: So moved.

25 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: Second.

1           MAYOR EVANS: It's been moved and  
2 seconded that we accept the audit as presented to  
3 us by Bill Talley. All in favor, say, "Aye."

4           COUNCIL MEMBERS: Aye.

5           MAYOR EVANS: All opposed.

6           COUNCIL MEMBERS: [no response]

7           MAYOR EVANS: The ayes have it. The  
8 audit has been accepted.

9           We have committee reports. Linda do you  
10 have a parks --

11           MS. WARDELL: Yes.

12           MAYOR EVANS: -- report for us today?

13           MS. WARDELL: I have a very -- fairly  
14 brief report to make.

15           But I just want to make one comment about  
16 the Fall Festival and the Parks Committee is so  
17 happy that the haunted trail took place and gave  
18 people that maybe haven't walked the trails an  
19 opportunity to see what we've done. And, in fact,  
20 a volunteer in my neighborhood had to ask me  
21 where Putney Pond was and how to get there  
22 because they had never been there before, so that  
23 was great. And I think everyone had a great time.  
24 It was -- it was a lot of fun.

25           And, Holly, great weather.

1 CITY ADMINISTRATOR LEVOLD: Yeah.

2 MS. WARDELL: Yeah. Better than  
3 Halloween.

4 We've had a couple more workdays to help  
5 maintain the trails in a sustainable manner. And  
6 I'm happy to report that, although our work crew a  
7 couple of weeks ago was small, we had another  
8 family, including a 5-year-old who worked like  
9 crazy; he was amazing. And it's always good to  
10 get new people involved in the work effort to keep  
11 the parks in good shape.

12 We also -- I -- I think I say this almost every  
13 time. We have three more Boy Scouts that are  
14 interested in doing Eagle projects, but from the  
15 time they say I'm interested until they actually do  
16 the project is sometimes more than year. So  
17 although three scouts have met with our liaison,  
18 Lynn Granger, and I think maybe Stuart met with at  
19 least one of the scouts.

20 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Uh-huh.

21 MS. WARDELL: We haven't seen any  
22 write-ups or anything for us to approve at this  
23 point. So, now that winter is setting in, I think it'll  
24 be next spring before we see anymore work done.

25 I guess the third thing I would say is that, you

1 know, we -- especially with the cold weather  
2 setting in -- setting in a little bit early this year,  
3 we don't anticipate anymore workdays for a few  
4 months, and the Parks Committee is probab --  
5 well, we're going to take the month of December  
6 off and we'll start planning in January for what we  
7 need to do in the spring. That's it.

8 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Linda?

9 MS. WARDELL: Yes.

10 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: I've got a  
11 question.

12 MS. WARDELL: Yes.

13 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Do the Boy  
14 Scouts -- do -- do we give them a list of things  
15 that we think we would like them to do?

16 MS. WARDELL: Yes. We -- the Parks  
17 Committee meets and talks about what our wish  
18 list.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Okay.

20 MS. WARDELL: And, in fact, the -- the  
21 upcoming projects would include one more  
22 boardwalk section in Little Hunting Creek Park.  
23 And then the next project is to put tenth of mile  
24 trail markers along the trails in Harrods Creek  
25 Park. So that's -- that's our next push.

1       And then when those are done, then we'll --  
2       we'll come up with some more --

3               COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB:   Okay.

4               MS. WARDELL:   -- projects for them.

5               COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB:   All right.

6       Thank you.

7               COUNCIL MEMBER MILES:   And the --

8               MS. WARDELL:   Thank you.

9               COUNCIL MEMBER MILES:   -- scout  
10       who's doing --

11               MS. WARDELL:   Oh.

12               COUNCIL MEMBER MILES:   -- the trail  
13       markers is planning to do it by the end of this  
14       year.

15               MS. WARDELL:   Oh, he is.   Okay.

16               COUNCIL MEMBER MILES:   He's -- and I  
17       know --

18               MS. WARDELL:   Even though he doesn't  
19       have anything written up or approved yet?

20               COUNCIL MEMBER MILES:   But his --  
21       he's -- he's my next door neighbor.

22               MS. WARDELL:   He's your neighbor.

23               COUNCIL MEMBER MILES:   And his --

24               MS. WARDELL:   Yeah.

25               COUNCIL MEMBER MILES:   -- mother is

1 all over --

2 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: On his case.

3 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Yeah.

4 MS. WARDELL: So he must be

5 approaching 18.

6 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Yeah. So

7 I -- I -- I feel pretty confident that --

8 MS. WARDELL: Okay.

9 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: -- we'll get  
10 that.

11 MS. WARDELL: That's great.

12 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: And then the  
13 other one, they're going to finish that section of  
14 the boardwalk. There's a middle section and then  
15 an end. And so that will be completed.

16 And then once that's done, they'll pick up  
17 about 200 yards down that trail and do one  
18 identical to it across another kind of low-lying  
19 area. And then that will connect to Harrod --  
20 that --

21 MAYOR EVANS: The back --

22 MS. WARDELL: Putney Pond.

23 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: -- Putney  
24 Pond.

25 MS. WARDELL: Yeah.

1 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: So we'll  
2 be -- at the next Fall Festival will we be able to  
3 walk through the parks to get to the beginning of  
4 the trail?

5 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Yeah. You --

6 MS. WARDELL: Sure.

7 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: -- actually,  
8 I've --

9 MS. WARDELL: Yes.

10 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: -- I have  
11 made a trail that's -- that it -- you can use it now.

12 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Yeah.

13 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: And it's  
14 only -- it's just if you have a lot of rain or in the  
15 winter, it's kind of mucky.

16 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Uh-huh.

17 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: But in the  
18 fall, we should be able to -- to have that be part of  
19 the trail next year.

20 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: That  
21 would be great.

22 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Yeah.

23 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Because  
24 a lot of us were walking.

25 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Yeah.

1 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: And it --  
2 certainly, even for an old person, it wasn't that  
3 far.

4 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Yeah. No.  
5 It'll be nice because you -- you'll be able to drop  
6 the kids off, and then they can come back and --

7 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Wow.  
8 Okay.

9 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: -- at the  
10 beginning of that boardwalk and just walk right  
11 back over to where everything is going on.

12 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Very  
13 good.

14 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: How long will  
15 it -- will -- will there be a continuous stretch of  
16 boardwalk? I'm thinking for a wheelchair. Do you  
17 have a long enough stretch that somebody could  
18 take a little zip around.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Are we  
20 having electric wheelchairs or push?

21 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: The long --  
22 the longest would be, they would start where the  
23 current one is going to begin --

24 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Yeah.

25 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: -- to where it

1 hits the woods.

2 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Yeah.

3 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: So that  
4 would be -- it'll be a small section.

5 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Yeah. But  
6 it's --

7 MS. WARDELL: And it goes along Little  
8 Hunting Creek, which is --

9 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Yeah.

10 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Right.

11 MS. WARDELL: -- a pretty area --

12 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Yeah.

13 MS. WARDELL: -- with a little waterfall  
14 and everything.

15 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: You know,  
16 I -- I -- fortunately none of us are in that position,  
17 but I can imagine --

18 MS. WARDELL: Right.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: -- that -- that  
20 if you are, then that would be just --

21 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: M-hm.

22 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: -- it would be  
23 much more wonderful than it seems to us to be  
24 able --

25 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Right.

1 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: -- to be -- to  
2 be there. And I -- got a pretty good start on a  
3 little bit of a handicapped accessible trail there.

4 MS. WARDELL: All right. Thank you.

5 MAYOR EVANS: Thanks, Linda.

6 Mr. Tucci, for the Forestation Board.

7 MR. TUCCI: Well, most of you are  
8 probably aware that we just finished planting 120  
9 trees in Harrods Creek Park. There were  
10 something like nine species planted.

11 I want to say that Councilman Miles was a real  
12 big contributor to this project, not only in the  
13 support of council, but also of getting out there  
14 and physically doing work, including driving 120  
15 stakes showing where each tree would go by  
16 species.

17 And Linda's also worked, Linda Wardell. And  
18 a very valuable contributor, also, was Andrea  
19 Hanlon, who helped us select the final species of  
20 trees. We'd also had earlier recommendation,  
21 some years ago, by Robert Beam, who was a state  
22 forester. So between his recommendations and  
23 Andrea's expertise, we got the right trees, I think,  
24 in the -- in the right place.

25 The actual planning was done by the Olmsted

1 Conservatory [sic] headed up by Major Waltman  
2 Heath [phonetic] was recommended by Stu. And  
3 we looked at a number of other people or groups  
4 that could this planning, and he was clearly the  
5 best one and was not only mechanically doing the  
6 work but was very enthusiastic about it, you know.  
7 And would certainly recommend him for the next  
8 stage of this project, you know.

9 We only spent about -- I have, roughly,  
10 \$19,000 out of that 23,000 we got from MSD. So  
11 we certainly have enough money to duplicate the  
12 project again in a year or so. And the timing was  
13 good, too. We got them in just before the cold  
14 weather, but it's, also, the -- just the right time to  
15 plant these trees. And they were watered in by the  
16 Olmsted team and all mulched. So we're off to a  
17 good start with those trees.

18 We also had 16 trees planted on Putney Lane.  
19 Stu just looked at them but --

20 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: They're  
21 beautiful.

22 MR. TUCCI: -- they -- they look great.

23 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: They're  
24 huge.

25 MR. TUCCI: And those also were

1 selected by Andrea Hanlon, our consultant.

2 And there's nine more trees going into various  
3 medians and entranceways. And, if you add up all  
4 these trees, plus the 70 trees we gave the citizens  
5 this year at the Arborfest, that's 215 trees. So  
6 Prospect is richer by 215 live -- live trees, correct  
7 trees.

8 Other things going on, there was a large dead  
9 tree removed by the homeowner on Hunting Creek  
10 Drive. It's been there quite a while, and it was  
11 judged to be hazardous and also unsightly, and the  
12 homeowner took it out.

13 Other issues going on, we've had a concern  
14 about tree roots raising cement in Bridgepointe.  
15 And this had come up earlier in Innisbrook. And  
16 probably in the Bridgepointe we're going to tell the  
17 homeowner that they can cut the root and -- in the  
18 process of repairing their driveway, and then we'll  
19 watch the tree to see if it slides or not.

20 It's a pin oak. And when the -- it was a pin  
21 oak, also it had raised some concerns that it was  
22 broke. At that time I talked to Peter Barber, who  
23 was state Urban Forester, and he felt that if they  
24 cut no more than around 25 or 30% of the tree  
25 root, and it being a pin oak, which he said was a

1 pretty hardy tree, the tree would probably --  
2 probably survive. We'll -- we'll see.

3 Any questions? Yes, sir.

4 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: I just have  
5 something, let me give this to you, Lee, and also  
6 the mayor, this gentleman who's a utility  
7 arborist --

8 MR. TUCCI: M-hm.

9 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- came to  
10 our property because I have part of Happy Hollow  
11 Road. And LG&E has a project on right now, where  
12 they're going to homeowners and will also come to  
13 the city, I would imagine, where they are going out  
14 and any ash trees that are -- they feel that are a  
15 danger to their power lines --

16 MR. TUCCI: Right.

17 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- they are  
18 removing them at no cost to the homeowner or  
19 anybody.

20 MR. TUCCI: Okay.

21 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Personally,  
22 just so -- you know, just to give you an example, I  
23 had four; two very large ones being removed from  
24 my backyard.

25 MR. TUCCI: Yeah. That --

1 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: The  
2 backyard.

3 MR. TUCCI: -- that could be very  
4 expensive.

5 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: It's a --  
6 well --

7 MR. TUCCI: Right.

8 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- I figure  
9 from the size of those trees, if I had to remove  
10 them, it'd be somewhere around \$4,000.

11 MR. TUCCI: Yeah.

12 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: So I'm going  
13 to give you this -- I'm going to give it to the  
14 mayor.

15 MR. TUCCI: Okay.

16 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: This -- this  
17 gentleman, you might one to contact him. You're  
18 talking about planting trees.

19 MR. TUCCI: Okay.

20 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Well, these  
21 folks are taking them out.

22 MR. TUCCI: Okay. Great.

23 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: The second  
24 issue for you and the mayor, I think, in my role as  
25 president of Hunting Creek, we had negotiated with

1 L -- or MSD the easement to take out the north  
2 septic treatment plant. And one of the things  
3 that's happening there, and we've got it photo  
4 documented for you-all to be part of your  
5 property -- the city's property, when they turn that  
6 plant over, I believe next year --

7 MR. TUCCI: M-hm.

8 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- is that next  
9 year? I think that's when it is. We tried to get  
10 them to put in some compensation in the document  
11 for killing trees, and they would not. They said  
12 you would have to file a claim after the fact.

13 MR. TUCCI: After the fact.

14 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: As far as two  
15 or three years later. But for you-all we have -- the  
16 country club has document that very well with  
17 pictures and --

18 MR. TUCCI: M-hm.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- shot  
20 stakes --

21 MR. TUCCI: M-hm.

22 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- and  
23 everything like that. I can tell you from my  
24 experience there's probably about ten trees that  
25 are going to die down there.

1 MR. TUCCI: They'll take out.

2 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Big ones.

3 MR. TUCCI: Right.

4 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: So you might  
5 want to get with Randy and whoever when they turn  
6 that plant over to the city because it's going to  
7 either cost the city some money or you can get  
8 MSD, by agreement, to take those trees out and  
9 replace them.

10 MR. TUCCI: Right. Well, they -- they  
11 compensated us for the trees that came out of  
12 Hunting Creek Park area, you know.

13 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: But you're  
14 not part of this easement document.

15 MR. TUCCI: Well.

16 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Yeah. That's  
17 a different --

18 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: That's why --

19 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: -- matter.

20 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- I'm telling  
21 you.

22 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Yeah.

23 MR. TUCCI: Right. I hear you.

24 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Okay.

25 MR. TUCCI: Right.

1 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: I think what  
2 will probably have to happen is the country club  
3 will have to go in and get the thing done. It will  
4 have to be a three-way deal.

5 MR. TUCCI: Three-way.

6 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: But, yeah, I  
7 can tell you there's ten big trees that are going to  
8 die down there.

9 MR. TUCCI: Okay. Thank you.

10 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Okay.

11 MR. TUCCI: Yeah.

12 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Thanks for  
13 all your work, Lee.

14 MAYOR EVANS: Library Committee  
15 update from Sandra.

16 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Thanks to  
17 Frank Fulcher, it's clean and neat upstairs.

18 And we've had the best year, to date, that  
19 we've ever had.

20 As Julia said, there's a placeholder amount of  
21 money put in income that we know we're going to  
22 make some of for the sales. And we use that, of  
23 course, to buy other books, to buy audio books,  
24 and things like that. We've already made a couple  
25 of hundred dollars more than that placeholder

1 amount, and we still have one more sale to go this  
2 year.

3 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Wow.  
4 Terrific.

5 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: So we're  
6 in fantastic shape.

7 We had about 24 volunteers who -- speaking  
8 of one over there, who worked on this thi -- thing  
9 and it went really smoothly. It was just a  
10 pleasure. The leftovers, if you will, have been  
11 donated to the VA and oncology practice, a food  
12 kitchen -- a food pantry, Grace & Glory Church's,  
13 and then the ones in fantastic condition we sold,  
14 and we got more money this time from Half Price  
15 Books than we've ever gotten before, so we're very  
16 happy.

17 MAYOR EVANS: Okay. Thank you.

18 Landscape and Beautification Committee. I  
19 have already, basically, given that report in  
20 talking about the contracts we're about to put out.  
21 And I'm having the committee review those before  
22 we do that. And I am going to appoint myself as  
23 chairman of that committee from henceforth, just  
24 so you know.

25 The History Book Committee, again, is Sandra

1 Leonard.

2 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: History  
3 book is coming along. We learn more all the time,  
4 and there are more and more people who come and  
5 volunteer information. And so our next meeting,  
6 which is tomorrow, is really partially to organize  
7 what, in the beginning, was really slow and then it  
8 was a trickle, and I think we've just started flood  
9 stage, but that's great.

10 One of the other things that will happen is,  
11 next week we're finally going to get to look at the  
12 archives of the Voice Tribune to see what kinds of  
13 things they've got that we might be able to use.  
14 So, it's coming. Someday we'll know what the  
15 history of this area is.

16 MAYOR EVANS: Yeah. I was talking to  
17 Sandra within the last hour when she told me they  
18 were going to be visiting the archives of the Voice  
19 Tribune that the Voice Tribune is about a third or  
20 fourth generation descendant of the newspaper  
21 which existed when this city was founded 40 years  
22 ago called The Prospect News, owned by Bruce  
23 Van Dusen [phonetic]. And I can't give you all the  
24 permutations since then that have now led to what  
25 it is today, but it -- if they have good archives,

1 that should go all the way back to that and that  
2 would be fascinating. I'd be interested to see  
3 what's in there.

4 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Actually,  
5 we've even found a couple of old Prospect News  
6 pa -- it looks like a not very terrific newsletter,  
7 but we've even found some old ones. And that's  
8 given us a step into the business community,  
9 which has been very, very difficult to find out  
10 anything because they advertised in there; they  
11 have little tiny things in there, so. . . We had  
12 more restaurants out here than I knew about.

13 Anyway, it's -- it's coming along. It's just --  
14 it's really difficult to do.

15 MAYOR EVANS: Yeah.

16 Finally, the Environmental Services  
17 Committee. Is there a report, Frank.

18 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: Well,  
19 there's just one item, and I think anybody who's on  
20 the city's -- city's mailing list has received the  
21 notice that there will be a e-cycle -- another  
22 e-cycle event at the church. And the pastor has  
23 been very good to us on this. Our last -- he  
24 wouldn't take any money. I -- I'm going to try to  
25 convince him to put out a little jar with some seed

1 money it because he does an excellent job. He  
2 does a -- does a real service to the city by -- by  
3 allowing us to recycle these electronic devices, et  
4 cetera. So you're all probably -- everybody here,  
5 I'm sure, has seen it. I ho -- I'm not sure that  
6 everybody has, but that's -- that's where we are  
7 right now with our committee.

8 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: What --  
9 what's that date again, Frank?

10 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: Ja --

11 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: January --

12 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: -- it's  
13 January the 20th.

14 CITY ADMINISTRATOR LEVOLD: 10th.

15 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: 10th.

16 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: 10th.

17 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: 10th.

18 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: 9 a.m to  
19 noon.

20 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: You've  
21 already started lining stuff up, too, huh? I've got  
22 a little place in the garage. An old fax machine  
23 out there.

24 MAYOR EVANS: We'll move into the  
25 police report. Chief?

1 CHIEF SHERRARD: Okay. October was  
2 a pretty slow month.

3 The house checks were up a little bit, about  
4 200 over the previous year.

5 Citations are down a little bit. That's to be  
6 expected, considering we've been down personnel  
7 for quite a little while; less people working, less  
8 people writing citations.

9 The -- the accidents have been up a little bit.  
10 I don't know whether this is an aberration. That's  
11 something we'll have to keep an eye on. Normally,  
12 we get something like ten a month, maybe, for  
13 non-injury accidents and two for injury accidents.  
14 This past month, in October, we had 18 non-injury  
15 accidents. That's really high for us, and five  
16 injury accidents.

17 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Are they  
18 al -- in different places or. . .

19 CHIEF SHERRARD: They're all up in --  
20 all up 42. We had several that were up there by  
21 the construction area, several at Timber Ridge,  
22 several right here at Carslaw, and then right down  
23 here at Fox Harbor. And there's probably a -- a  
24 handful at each one of those location, most of  
25 which were just rear-end collisions. And as we

1 refer to it in the police field, RCI, rectal cranial  
2 inversion.

3 [laughter]

4 CHIEF SHERRARD: You can you put that  
5 together; somebody had their head where it didn't  
6 need to be.

7 [laughter]

8 CHIEF SHERRARD: Let's see. Dispatch  
9 runs were down a little bit. Officer initiated runs  
10 were down significantly, again, because we didn't  
11 have as many people working.

12 No arrests for the month.

13 Reports. There's only two of them really  
14 worth talking about; one of which was interesting  
15 was, at the Circle K, we had somebody we believed  
16 had passed counterfeit bills. And the officer was  
17 called over there, collected the bills, but the odd  
18 part was that they were \$1 bills.

19 Well, if you know anybody about  
20 counterfeiting, nobody in their right mind spends  
21 time messing with \$1 bills. So you get them over  
22 here, and I kid you not, these were the strangest  
23 looking things you've ever seen, but texture of the  
24 bill and everything looked really good. So, we  
25 collected them, contacted Secret Service. They

1 actually sent out a couple of agents a couple days  
2 later, and they looked at them, and they used their  
3 little devices. I wasn't there at the time that they  
4 came in. But they say, "You know what, we  
5 believe that they're actually real."

6 But what happens is, you can buy bills in an  
7 actual sheet. But most people put them in a  
8 frame and put them on their wall.

9 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Yeah.

10 CHIEF SHERRARD: Well, somebody took  
11 something out of a frame and cut them up. But  
12 they did such a horrible job of cutting the bills  
13 that they were so small that they looked funny, and  
14 so it immediately through a clue. So they passed  
15 them over here at the drugstore, and I think they  
16 passed them at the hardware store, too. So you're  
17 getting these things like you're getting counterfeit  
18 bills. But nobody does ones.

19 So even the Secret Service is, "That's crazy.  
20 Nobody does it."

21 But when they came out, even they thought,  
22 This is so -- this is such a bad cut job that  
23 although they're testing right, we're going to send  
24 them off. So they, literally, sent off \$1 bills, had  
25 them tested and sent them back to us with a letter

1 that says, No, they're real.

2 So what they did is, they send them -- they  
3 send them to your bank, they put them in what's  
4 called a "bad bill envelope," and they get --  
5 restore real bills.

6 Again -- so actually no crime is committed.  
7 The reports are sent out as unfounded. You take a  
8 report on counterfeit and then you back it out and  
9 you unfound it. So no crime has been committed.

10 But I thought it was interesting.

11 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Yeah.

12 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: M-hm.

13 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Sounds like  
14 some teenager got a hold of the parents' --

15 CHIEF SHERRARD: Yeah. That could've  
16 been a break-in, where somebody broke --

17 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Yeah.

18 CHIEF SHERRARD: -- in somebody's  
19 house and stole their bills and cut them up, but we  
20 haven't had any here.

21 And then we did have a golfstart -- a golfstart,  
22 a golfcart that was taken from the club. And  
23 somebody used and it drove across the club and --  
24 and did some damage on about four holes, and  
25 then the thing was found abandoned and covered

1 with mud the following day, is when it was  
2 recovered. But they did some damage to the  
3 course.

4 MAYOR EVANS: What did they do?

5 CHIEF SHERRARD: They basically just  
6 drive it over, like, the edge of a green and put tire  
7 tracks on the green or across the tee box or -- or  
8 whatever. So it does -- criminal mischief or  
9 damage to the golf course.

10 MAYOR EVANS: Did you ever find out  
11 who did it?

12 CHIEF SHERRARD: There actually was a  
13 witness that -- that thought they recognized  
14 someone later in the evening at a fast-food  
15 restaurant, so we've got a tag on that, so we do  
16 have something to follow-up with. So, we'll see  
17 how that turns out.

18 MAYOR EVANS: I'd be curious any  
19 follow-up that you could tell us about on the  
20 ramming of the stone wall at the entrance to  
21 Hunting Creek.

22 CHIEF SHERRARD: I --

23 MAYOR EVANS: I understand the guy  
24 was, unharmed, shall we say.

25 CHIEF SHERRARD: Well, he did have a

1 lightly [sic] cut to his head. But he had been to  
2 the football game a little bit earlier in the evening,  
3 that Thursday night game. And I think he had dual  
4 citizenship, both in Florida and in Kentucky. He'd  
5 been in the -- as the statement goes, he'd been in  
6 one of the luxury boxes out at the football game,  
7 drinking there; he had flasks in both pockets in his  
8 sport jacket.

9 And, according to the witness, never tapped  
10 his brakes, just left the road, went right up there  
11 and hit the wall. And then as he's in there, the  
12 car catches fire. And, fortunately enough for him,  
13 a former firefighter happens to show pick up and  
14 gets him out. And after he gets him out, the guy  
15 says, "Well, what did I hit?"

16 And the guy turned around and says, "Dude,  
17 look at the wall."

18 So they look at the wall that his car's next to  
19 and the car's in -- fully involved in flames, so. . .

20 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: He was  
21 lucky.

22 CHIEF SHERRARD: He was. He was  
23 taken to the hospital. They took him to University  
24 Hospital because he had a head injury. So we  
25 had -- we had blood drawn for our purposes. And

1 once it comes back from the lab, obviously, we'll  
2 make a decision whether or not to charge him.

3 And --

4 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Is he a  
5 resident of Prospect?

6 CHIEF SHERRARD: No. He had -- he  
7 had a residency in -- in Florida. It's one of the  
8 cities that was north of West Palm Beach, it wasn't  
9 in We -- Palm Beach, but it was just north of it and  
10 then in Oldham County.

11 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Ah.

12 CHIEF SHERRARD: So he was heeded to  
13 Oldham County.

14 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: So he just  
15 came off of 42?

16 CHIEF SHERRARD: He was just driving  
17 down 42 and either passed out or fell asleep at the  
18 wheel and just [whistles], right up and hit the wall.  
19 He wasn't trying to get off --

20 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Oh, okay.

21 CHIEF SHERRARD: -- to go up into  
22 Hunting Creek.

23 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Okay.

24 CHIEF SHERRARD: He just -- he just  
25 happened to go into Hunting Creek now that he's

1 going along with it [phonetic].

2 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Okay.

3 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Well, better  
4 a brick wall --

5 CHIEF SHERRARD: So his --

6 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: -- than  
7 another car coming.

8 CHIEF SHERRARD: That's true.

9 That's -- that's absolutely true, better to veer off  
10 to the right and hit a wall than -- than anybody  
11 else, but --

12 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: But we --

13 CHIEF SHERRARD: He wa -- he was  
14 insured, so the city will get their stuff all paid for,  
15 so. . .

16 MAYOR EVANS: Okay. And after this  
17 fun, we have two ordinance to look at. I'm jumping  
18 over the audit because we've already talked about  
19 that and adopted it.

20 I'm jumping over the sign morn -- moratorium  
21 so that we can discuss it in connection with the  
22 proposed amendment to the sign ordinance when  
23 we get there.

24 But first, we an ordinance, Number 538, which  
25 I'm going to ask Councilman Stuart Miles to read,

1 if he would.

2 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: All right.

3 [reads] City of Prospect, Ordinance Number 538,  
4 Series 2014, An Ordinance Amending the Budget of  
5 the General Fund of the City of Prospect for the  
6 Fiscal Year Beginning July 1st, 2014 and ending  
7 June 30th, 2015.

8 MAYOR EVANS: All right. This is the  
9 second reading, having been read last month. And  
10 so it's appropriate to ask if there is a motion to  
11 adopt this ordinance?

12 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: So moved.

13 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Second.

14 MAYOR EVANS: It's been moved and  
15 seconded.

16 Is there discussion?

17 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Just a  
18 question. The trees that we just planted are  
19 coming out of this money?

20 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Yes.

21 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Okay.

22 MAYOR EVANS: Did you say, "Yes"?

23 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Yes.

24 MAYOR EVANS: Anything further?

25 COUNCIL MEMBERS: [no audible

1 response]

2 MAYOR EVANS: Hearing none, we'll  
3 move to a vote. All in favor, say, "Aye."

4 COUNCIL MEMBERS: Aye.

5 MAYOR EVANS: All opposed.

6 COUNCIL MEMBERS: [no response]

7 MAYOR EVANS: It's unanimous, the ayes  
8 have it, this ordinance has been adopted.

9 So we'll move to the next one, which is  
10 Ordinance 539, Series 2014. And I think it would  
11 be appropriate to ask Mr. Brab to do the honors on  
12 that one.

13 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: All right.  
14 [reads] City of Prospect , Ordinance 539, Series  
15 2014. An Ordinance Relating to the Amendment  
16 and Modification of Chapter 157 in the Code of  
17 Ordinances of the City of Prospect.

18 MAYOR EVANS: All right. Is there a  
19 motion regarding that ordinance?

20 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Motion to  
21 adopt.

22 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Second.

23 MAYOR EVANS: It's been moved and  
24 seconded that that ordinance be adopted.

25 Is there discussion?

1 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: I'd like to  
2 make a comment on it. I -- while I agree entirely  
3 in the -- the preambles and the -- the reason -- the  
4 reasons that we're doing this, I think it, as written,  
5 lacks a -- lacks an ability to enforce properly.  
6 And, therefore, I have taken it upon myself to offer  
7 some alternate language, which I don't think --  
8 well -- well, out of the three of the five -- three  
9 out of five items I -- is irrelevant.

10 But the -- two of them re -- I think require  
11 rewording, specifically, the "approved" colors. As  
12 the ordinance that is proposed for -- for the  
13 second reading, defines "approved colors," there  
14 is nothing in the body of the -- there's nothing in  
15 the body of the ordinance that says what to do with  
16 it, whether they are prohibited; whether they are --  
17 require a permit, whether they don't require a  
18 permit. So it makes it -- to use the language, the  
19 colors -- and I think that's far -- almost irrelevant.

20 But I think if we're going to do something with  
21 colors, we have to say that any signs that aren't --  
22 don't have approved colors, are prohibited. And  
23 that's a -- that's a separate section in the -- in the  
24 existing ordinance. And would -- therefore, I  
25 would like to see us add that so that "approved

1 colors" have meaning. Sticking a -- sticking a  
2 definition in the definitions section, I think, is -- is  
3 rather pointless unless you, in the body, say what  
4 you're going to do with it.

5 The second item -- the second language issue  
6 is the -- the 2 (b) 3. a., where it says "The sign  
7 area cannot exceed 50% of the length. . ." Now  
8 that is a statement that makes absolutely no sense  
9 because you have an area that is equivalent to a  
10 length. And I think that language is confusing,  
11 and I think that we need to -- without changing the  
12 intent, I think there's a way to -- way to deal with  
13 it. I don't think that the words that I put in, cross  
14 out a few if we have to, but change any of the  
15 intent of what has been proposed, but it does  
16 appreciably facilitate enforcement.

17 I think that -- I'll just ask the mayor. He's  
18 in -- he's in charge of enforcement. He -- and I  
19 hope he's had an opportunity to look at both of  
20 them.

21 MAYOR EVANS: I appreciate it.

22 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: Is there  
23 something I'm missing or should we do something  
24 else?

25 MAYOR EVANS: What are you asking

1 me?

2 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: I'm  
3 asking you -- the enforceability of, what is it, 529,  
4 as stated, without -- without having a -- with  
5 having only a definition, but not a disposition of  
6 approved colors, and then the other one is having  
7 a -- having a -- a sign -- and these aren't Bill's --  
8 these aren't Bill's words, these come right out of  
9 the old -- the -- the old one, which is mean --  
10 which is meaningless. So I think I would  
11 personally like to see, if we're going to do this,  
12 and -- and -- that we do it such that we don't have  
13 a pointless unenforceable or difficulty in enforcing  
14 the changes we're going to make.

15 MAYOR EVANS: Well, since --

16 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: I want to --

17 MAYOR EVANS: -- I've been asked --

18 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: -- ask,  
19 again, why that -- why it is unenforceable? I  
20 guess I'm --

21 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Well --

22 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: -- not getting  
23 that.

24 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: -- I think  
25 that -- that what he's saying, using words like you

1 and I might use instead of like an engineer might  
2 use,

3 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: M-hm.

4 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: -- there's  
5 not -- he's got a geometric thing that is the  
6 combination of two measurements and then that  
7 combination thing is being made equal to a single  
8 measurement or a percentage of a single  
9 measurement; in other words, the math is  
10 impossible.

11 THE REPORTER: I'm sorry, in other  
12 words what?

13 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: The math  
14 is impossible.

15 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: And -- and  
16 you're talking about --

17 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: It's a se --  
18 se -- it's semantics.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: Well, no,  
20 it's not -- it's not semantics. We have a definition  
21 within our existing ordinance that defines "sign  
22 area." I mean, it's a very -- very --

23 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: I -- Frank --

24 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: --  
25 discrete --

1 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- Frank, I  
2 understand what you're saying. I -- I think you  
3 make a good point on the approved colors. But as  
4 far as 2 (b) 3. a., it's an and/or and it's the square  
5 footage plus the height, so --

6 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: No. A  
7 square footage doesn't a length. It never did; it  
8 never will.

9 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: But it also  
10 says "and three feet in height."

11 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: Well, I --  
12 fine. I agree with that. That part.

13 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: What I'm  
14 saying --

15 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: I'm  
16 saying that we have a -- we have --

17 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Okay.

18 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: -- a  
19 poorly written thing in English that we should  
20 change. If we're going to do it, I would hope that  
21 we would do it the best we could.

22 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: So, Frank,  
23 you're saying the -- the sign area cannot exceed --

24 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: May not  
25 exceed. See, the -- the only problem I have with

1 your -- with your change, Frank, is that there is no  
2 section in the -- in the definitions that defines  
3 "ground level frontage." There is a section that  
4 defines "facade" --

5 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: M-hm.

6 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- in our  
7 current definitions.

8 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: M-hm.

9 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: "Ground level  
10 frontage" can -- even if there's no definition for  
11 that, you could very easily have a problem again.

12 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: M-hm.

13 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: So you have  
14 taken "facade" out of there, which is dangerous,  
15 because all of our -- rest of our ordinance refers  
16 to that when you look at height, and you've put a  
17 new definition in there, "ground" -- or a new  
18 phrase "ground level frontage."

19 As far as the other wording that you have, I  
20 think it's fine; it doesn't change the intent at all.  
21 But you have put something new in there. The  
22 color part, I think you've done -- I think is fine.  
23 But what is "ground level frontage"? You don't  
24 have it in the definitions --

25 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: Well --

1 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- there.

2 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: -- well,  
3 I'm -- I'm not married to "facade" versus that. I  
4 mean --

5 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Well, again, I  
6 think that's --

7 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: -- I think  
8 the intent is -- is there.

9 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: You  
10 notice that he snuck "green" into the colors.

11 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Excuse me?

12 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: He snuck  
13 "green" into the colors. Because Stuart Miles and  
14 Sandy Tucci, under the proposal, would not be  
15 allowed to have their political signs next time.

16 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Well, I've  
17 used those for eight years now. I probably --

18 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: You think  
19 they're ready for a new color com [phonetic]?

20 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: But  
21 anyway, I -- I have no problem with change --  
22 going back to "facade." I mean, that's --

23 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: I think -- I  
24 think until you change the -- like this more  
25 comprehensive thing that you're about -- have

1 been talking about, the "ground level" needs to  
2 come out because it's not in the definition section.

3 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: Okay.

4 That -- that's fine.

5 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: And -- and as  
6 far as your wording, it -- it -- I -- I understand  
7 what you're saying, and I have no problem with  
8 that if we want to change it to -- to that. But the  
9 intent of both of these and all that we've done with  
10 this is quite clear. And that's to help the mayor  
11 lift the moratorium, which is -- we've been  
12 discussing since last spring.

13 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: We could  
14 just lift the moratorium, though.

15 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: No.

16 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: You --

17 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: There's  
18 nothing --

19 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: No.

20 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: No; you  
21 cannot.

22 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: -- that --

23 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Because then  
24 you can have --

25 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: No.

1 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- you can  
2 have the same thing that we argued about --

3 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: M-hm.

4 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- and caused  
5 this whole thing, you'll have a sign -- they could  
6 put a sign in Lake Mortensen's [phonetic].

7 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: There's  
8 nothing pending. There are no signs --

9 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: That  
10 doesn't --

11 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: That  
12 doesn't --

13 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- fit.

14 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: -- mean --

15 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: That  
16 doesn't --

17 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: -- there  
18 won't be --

19 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- mean  
20 anything --

21 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: -- one  
22 pending --

23 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- Sandra.

24 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: -- tomorrow.

25 Absolute -- I would never be vote to lift the

1 moratorium until we have something in place that  
2 will take care or never having another one of those  
3 signs --

4 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: The point  
5 being is that there was --

6 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Except  
7 that it -- I'm sorry.

8 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: The point  
9 being --

10 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Except  
11 that it really doesn't do that. For example, I was  
12 talking to the Code Enforcement person right  
13 before, and his question is: What is red? What is  
14 blue?

15 And that -- that's a valid question. I don't  
16 know the answer to it.

17 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Well, that's  
18 getting to a different issue of do we lift the  
19 moratorium or not. We do not --

20 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: We should --

21 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: -- you know,  
22 we don't lift the moratorium until we have  
23 something. And what we do is, we replace -- we  
24 lift the moratorium because we have something in  
25 place that will keep us from getting a humongous

1 sign.

2 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: You have  
3 colors like you have across the street; you have  
4 this humongous sign like you have across the  
5 street, which is what brought about the moratorium  
6 in the first place.

7 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: No. I -- I  
8 don't disagree with you at all on size. I mean, I  
9 truly don't.

10 And in regard to color, I don't think we're  
11 there yet. I -- I am glad you brought it up. I'm  
12 glad we're talking about it. I don't think these  
13 words create an enforceable document.

14 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Well, I think,  
15 actually, the correction that Frank suggested, and  
16 Frank and I talked about this last night, and this is  
17 just me being an ex-English teacher, I think, as I  
18 read the correction, it sounds to me that, if -- for  
19 instance, Justice, a store that I'm familiar with  
20 because I have granddaughters of the right age,  
21 that wonderful hot pink that you really love when  
22 you're 8 years old, if Justice put in a store, they  
23 could put up their hot pink sign, of course,  
24 because it's registered.

25 But the way I read Frank's correction, once

1 any sign has hot pink in it, then it becomes an  
2 okay sign. Whereas, the way it's written  
3 originally, you've got a period and then you have a  
4 new sentence that refers only to registered  
5 trademarks. So it can't -- that hot pink can't bleed  
6 over from the Justice sign into the beer sign or  
7 whatever that might go up in another --

8 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: There --

9 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: -- store.

10 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: -- there  
11 is nothing in our ordinance right now --

12 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: About color.

13 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: -- that  
14 deals with -- well, that deals with logos.

15 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: M-hm.

16 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: They just  
17 started are creeping in.

18 If you look at the older signs, the channel  
19 letters looked like channel letters. If you look at  
20 the newer signs, like the dentistry one is the one  
21 that drives all of us crazy, not only is there a  
22 channel letter issue but there's a color issue.  
23 And -- and I -- I'm not -- I think we need to deal  
24 with that. I'm not positive that this does.

25 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Well, what if

1 we, for this stopgap measure, deal with the -- just  
2 deal with the size? Because that was the main  
3 concern. I know we didn't like the color, but the  
4 size was the thing that had really shocked  
5 everybody's subconscious.

6 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: M-hm.

7 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Because  
8 that's not being too bombastic.

9 MAYOR EVANS: Well, if you're going to  
10 deal with it tonight, you wa -- you have only one  
11 ordinance in front of you, which is now first  
12 reading.

13 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: That's right.

14 MAYOR EVANS: Okay. And that's the  
15 one done by Bill Brab.

16 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Right.

17 MAYOR EVANS: If you're going to wait  
18 for another month, then you'll have two in front of  
19 you, the one done by Bill Brab and the one done by  
20 Frank Fulcher, and that puts it off for another 30  
21 days.

22 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Plus you gave  
23 the moratorium on it.

24 MAYOR EVANS: I want to say that I feel  
25 that I can enforce an ordinance that says that your

1 sign may be red, and somebody comes in and  
2 wants one in hot pink. I think I can deal with that.  
3 Okay.

4 My only comment, in terms of what I see in  
5 Bill's ordinance, is the one in 2 (b) 3, on the  
6 second page, where it says, and this is something  
7 Frank mentioned: "The sign area cannot exceed  
8 50% of the --

9 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Length.

10 MAYOR EVANS: -- length of the  
11 facade. . ." and that, I find --

12 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Yeah.

13 MAYOR EVANS: -- confusing.

14 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: We -- and  
15 that's the intent of what -- I think, what Frank is --

16 MAYOR EVANS: And --

17 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: --  
18 recommending.

19 MAYOR EVANS: -- and if you could tell  
20 me what -- what that means --

21 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Yeah.

22 MAYOR EVANS: -- I'll be happy --

23 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Yeah.

24 MAYOR EVANS: If --

25 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: I think we can

1 use Frank's language on that.

2 THE REPORTER: I'm sorry, you can use  
3 what, sir?

4 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: We could use  
5 Frank's language on 2 (b) 3.

6 THE REPORTER: Thank you.

7 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: The question  
8 is --

9 MAYOR EVANS: Actually that'd be --  
10 that would be best.

11 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: I think it  
12 would be easier for the --

13 MAYOR EVANS: Yeah.

14 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- Code  
15 Enforcement --

16 MAYOR EVANS: Yeah.

17 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- person  
18 and -- and --

19 MAYOR EVANS: Yeah.

20 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- for the  
21 mayor to enforce that.

22 The question is, we've had this moratorium  
23 since April. This was put in front -- mine was put  
24 in front of the Council July. We're talking about it  
25 in November. Okay. I mean, and this isn't that

1 hard.

2 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Actually,  
3 it is. The act -- the earlier -- the first ordinance,  
4 the one that has not been amended yet, is, the  
5 more you look at it, the more you read the  
6 individual components of it is very poorly drafted  
7 for what we're trying to accomplish with it now. If  
8 you sit down and try to figure out what kind of  
9 window signs you can have in a standalone  
10 business, you'll find that they left that whole  
11 clause out, and you can't have any.

12 Now we never stopped anybody from having  
13 one.

14 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: It says --

15 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: But --

16 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- at the  
17 beginning of the ordinance you may have one of  
18 each.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: No.

20 It's -- it --

21 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: You may have  
22 a maximum of one of each.

23 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Only of  
24 specific kinds of things. But if you look at the  
25 component that deals with the businesses, that

1 component of the ordinance is very difficult to deal  
2 with.

3 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Well, I agree  
4 that if you're -- if you're [sic] want to take a  
5 comprehensive look at it like you guys are doing,  
6 that it's going to take a long time. And --

7 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: It is.

8 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: -- and that's  
9 why I -- I'm in favor of doing what Bill is wanting  
10 to do, and -- and, again, I agree with the language  
11 that Frank has written is maybe a little clearer.  
12 But I would like do something -- have it done  
13 and -- and lift the moratorium by our next meeting.  
14 And I'm not --

15 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: M-hm.

16 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: -- married to  
17 whichever of the two the Council decides to do.

18 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Just have a  
19 question. Do you feel okay with the se -- the color  
20 part, Mr. Mayor, on the one that I wrote?

21 MAYOR EVANS: Yep.

22 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: And I -- I  
23 think --

24 MAYOR EVANS: I -- I understand Frank's  
25 point --

1 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: I do too.

2 MAYOR EVANS: -- that it would be  
3 better to have it both places rather than just the  
4 one place. But the fact that you have, up front,  
5 that these are the colors that permitted, I think,  
6 would prevail if this, and God knows what, would  
7 ever wind up in front of a judge. But if it did, I  
8 think it would prevail that you can only have red,  
9 blue, whatever I have. Even though it's not  
10 what -- where it should be, as Frank correctly says  
11 back on the prohibited stuff.

12 Not the other thing that Frank brings out, I  
13 think -- Bill, I think we all agree --

14 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: It think it's --

15 MAYOR EVANS: -- it would be better to  
16 say --

17 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Right.

18 MAYOR EVANS: -- the sign cannot  
19 exceed the 50% of the length or whatever it --  
20 language Frank had, in -- in lieu of --

21 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: I -- I think --

22 MAYOR EVANS: -- some area. Because  
23 this mixes area with length, which is. . .

24 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: I think 2 (b)  
25 3. a., as Frank has written is just fine.

1           MAYOR EVANS:    So how -- how do we get  
2    there.

3           COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI:    Can we --  
4    can we --

5           COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB:    Well --

6           COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI:    -- can we --

7           COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB:    -- that's  
8    why --

9           COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI:    -- can we --

10          COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB:    -- Grover  
11    should've been here.

12          COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI:    -- can we  
13    just amend this?

14          COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB:    We could  
15    amend it; yes.

16          COUNCIL MEMBER MILES:    So I may -- I  
17    suggest we amend the bills with Frank's language  
18    on 2 (b) 3. and that'd be the change and we do a  
19    first reading --

20          COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI:    But Frank's  
21    language eliminating the "ground level" --

22          COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB:    Yeah. You  
23    can't have "ground level" in there.

24          COUNCIL MEMBER MILES:    Right.  
25    Eliminating --

1 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: -- the  
2 "ground level."

3 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: There's no  
4 definition --

5 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: That's not  
6 a deal breaker.

7 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Yeah.  
8 There's not a definition for that one [phonetic].

9 So we would -- we would amend 2 (b) 3. a.,  
10 take Frank's amended language but leave "facade"  
11 in.

12 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: Yes.

13 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: That's right.

14 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: And take out  
15 the "ground level" --

16 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Right.

17 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: And this  
18 would -- how would this work, Mr. Mayor. This  
19 would be the first reading or -- or is this -- since it  
20 meets the intent of what has already been  
21 approved, would it just be a -- a modification that  
22 we -- that's available to us to have a second  
23 reading.

24 MAYOR EVANS: I think -- I want it done  
25 properly. And if you're going to change what was

1 read the last time, I think you should do it as a  
2 first reading tonight and a second reading the next  
3 time we get together. That's what I would like to  
4 do.

5 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: Well,  
6 then if -- if that's the case, if this is a first  
7 reading, and you feel that it would be easier to  
8 incorporate the inclusion of the prohibited sign  
9 language, I mean, it -- it just makes it easier to  
10 enforce.

11 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: I think  
12 the easiest thing to do is pass Bill's tonight and  
13 then pass Frank's next month. I think --

14 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Well,  
15 and --

16 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: -- it's  
17 important to --

18 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: --  
19 some -- we -- then we have to publish and  
20 everything else. If we pass both of them, we've  
21 got two, roughly, \$1200 expenses that we're  
22 facing.

23 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: I have a  
24 question. When we publish, can we do a two-fer  
25 and publish --

1 MAYOR EVANS: Yes.

2 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: -- two. So  
3 we've -- we've just done one tonight; right?

4 MAYOR EVANS: Yeah.

5 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: So if we pass  
6 Bill's, it wouldn't cost anymore because we're  
7 already going to have --

8 MAYOR EVANS: It doesn't -- whatever it  
9 is you pass will not take effect until you publish it.

10 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Right. But  
11 what I'm saying is, we're going to have to  
12 publish --

13 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: I ju --

14 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: -- the one --

15 MAYOR EVANS: Huh?

16 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- I would  
17 just amend the language in 2 (b) 3. a. that -- that  
18 Frank has proposed, taking out the "ground level  
19 frontage" and adding back "facade," and then just  
20 do this is the first reading of it, the second  
21 reading next one.

22 MR. SPEAKER: Right.

23 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Is that all  
24 right with you, Frank?

25 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: Well, I --

1 Bill, since we're doing that, to make it cleaner,  
2 that does -- you know, the ell [phonetic] signs  
3 with -- signs with colors other than approved  
4 colors. Since we have a definition of "approved  
5 colors," we say "signs that don't have approved  
6 colors are prohibited." And there is a -- there's a  
7 section in --

8 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: That's fine.

9 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: I mean, in  
10 the --

11 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: You're  
12 adding -- you're just adding "ell."

13 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: Just  
14 adding -- just adding "ell" for --

15 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: All right.

16 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: --  
17 clarification.

18 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Fine.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: And that  
20 cleans it up for the people that have to enforce it,  
21 hopefully.

22 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Fine with me.

23 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: That -- I  
24 think that's a good idea.

25 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: So let's --

1 let's -- we can treat Frank's as a first reading?

2 MAYOR EVANS: Okay. So we've  
3 just had a first reading of the. . . [examines  
4 document] --

5 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: It's not even  
6 an ordinance.

7 MAYOR EVANS: Doesn't have a number.

8 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Exactly.

9 MAYOR EVANS: Be 540?

10 CITY ADMINISTRATOR LEVOLD: 540.

11 MAYOR EVANS: I'm going to write that  
12 on here, Frank.

13 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: 538?

14 MAYOR EVANS: We have Number 540.

15 And just to be formal about it, Frank, will you  
16 please read your Ordinance Number 540. Just  
17 read the caption of it as a first reading, please.

18 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: An  
19 Ordinance Relating to the Amendment and  
20 Modification of Chapter 157 of the Code of  
21 Ordinances of the City of Prospect.

22 MAYOR EVANS: All right. And that was  
23 Ordinance Number 540, Series 2040 -- 2014;  
24 correct?

25 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: Yes.

1           MAYOR EVANS: All right.

2           COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Now how do  
3 we, for the record, make a clean record of the  
4 changes and things that I think we've discussed  
5 tonight? Do we write that, physically, on what  
6 Frank has?

7           COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: It wou --  
8 it would have to be on the agenda and accompany  
9 the agenda for the next meeting.

10          MAYOR EVANS: No. Wait.

11          COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Hm-m.  
12 Hm-m.

13          MAYOR EVANS: If you're going to  
14 change Frank's ordinance for a first reading, you  
15 should change it before you have the first reading.

16          COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Yeah.

17          MAYOR EVANS: And then have the  
18 reading of the ordinance.

19          COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Yeah.

20          MAYOR EVANS: If we are doing  
21 something other than what Frank has printed on  
22 paper --

23          COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Yeah; we  
24 are.

25          MAYOR EVANS: Then --

1 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: We are.

2 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: We are.

3 MAYOR EVANS: Well, then you --

4 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: Well, we

5 had --

6 MAYOR EVANS: -- better change it and  
7 then have a reading of that.

8 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: We had  
9 agreed that we would delete the "ground level  
10 frontage" in favor of "facade." We had already  
11 agreed --

12 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: And we -- and  
13 the approved color section. And --

14 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: And --

15 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- leave in  
16 "ell."

17 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: -- and  
18 leave in "ell."

19 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Right.

20 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: So --

21 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: The only  
22 change --

23 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: -- that  
24 the --

25 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Yeah. Use

1 like approved color section, as the mayor said. He  
2 says that's enforceable. And leave your "ell."

3 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: Leave the  
4 "ell."

5 And the other things are exactly what, you  
6 know, you had put in -- in the previous one, so. . .

7 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: And, again,  
8 my question is: Is what we've just done created  
9 the record we need?

10 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Should  
11 we vote on the amendment that we just articulated;  
12 is that what you're saying?

13 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: I -- it's just  
14 a question. I don't know if that's enough or -- I  
15 mean, I don't think we have to vote on it. I mean,  
16 do we need to amend --

17 MAYOR EVANS: That's a good --

18 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: Frank's  
19 amendment, I -- we don't vote on.

20 MAYOR EVANS: You're not voting on  
21 anything.

22 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: It's a first  
23 reading.

24 MAYOR EVANS: What you're doing is  
25 having a first reading of a proffer ordinance, but

1 the ordinance has to read the way you want it to  
2 be for the first reading.

3 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: Got you.

4 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Can someone  
5 simply read aloud for the court reporter to record  
6 the exact language that we're shifting to? So  
7 along with saying, you know, City of Prospect,  
8 Ordinance Number 540, we then drop down and  
9 also read 12 [sic], 2 (b) 3. a. in the corrected  
10 form.

11 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Plus the  
12 ell.

13 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Yeah. Plus  
14 the --

15 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: That's  
16 also the only --

17 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: Yeah.  
18 That was on there.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: The  
20 only -- the only change from what this --

21 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Is that  
22 one.

23 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: -- is --

24 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Right  
25 there.

1 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: -- is  
2 reinstating "facade" --

3 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Right.

4 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: -- and  
5 deleting the next three words.

6 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Correct.

7 MAYOR EVANS: And that's the only --

8 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: And --

9 MAYOR EVANS: -- change?

10 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- and those  
11 colors.

12 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: Those are  
13 the only changes.

14 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: And the  
15 colors. The mayor is comfortable with the color  
16 section from mine.

17 MAYOR EVANS: I'm -- I'm comfortable  
18 with it.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: Okay.  
20 I -- let's -- let's not start a. . .

21 MAYOR EVANS: All right. The  
22 Ordinance Number 540, Series 2040 -- 2014, as  
23 given a first reading by Mr. Fulcher, is as  
24 presented, except only in Section 2 (B), 2 (b) 3.  
25 a., which is labeled "Wall/marquee, the word

1 "facade," which has been stricken, will appear and  
2 the words "ground level frontage" are stricken so  
3 that it will read: "The sign may not exceed 50% of  
4 the length of the facade or have an area greater  
5 than 100 square feet, et cetera."

6 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Greater than  
7 50 --

8 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: 50 square --

9 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: -- square  
10 feet.

11 MAYOR EVANS: 50 square feet, pardon  
12 me.

13 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: Yeah.

14 MAYOR EVANS: Is that correct?

15 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: M-hm.

16 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Yes.

17 MAYOR EVANS: Except only for that, the  
18 rest of it is as printed right here.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: So -- and  
20 you're okay with the approved colors under  
21 Frank's, where a registered trademark or a logo  
22 could have hot pink in it and it would be okay?

23 MAYOR EVANS: I don't know.

24 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Well, and  
25 that's my point.

1 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Personally, I  
2 liked the original language --

3 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: That's why --

4 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: -- with the --

5 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- my --

6 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: -- approved  
7 colors.

8 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- "approved  
9 colors" were the right wording.

10 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Because it  
11 separates registered --

12 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: It separates  
13 the --

14 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: -- corporate  
15 logos from the other signs instead of running it  
16 all together. It makes it clear, I think, if we want  
17 to --

18 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: Well --

19 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: -- say that.

20 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: -- you  
21 know, we've -- we've -- we've had a lot of  
22 discussion on this, and -- and much of it has been  
23 focused around fairness to the business  
24 community. And we've heard from people in the  
25 business community, "Well, if they can do it, why

1 can't I."

2 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Well,  
3 Frank -- Frank, what I'm talking about isn't  
4 fairness, it's just about the structure of the  
5 English language. That's why I would like two  
6 sentences.

7 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: No.  
8 It's -- it's fairness, Sandy. Because if we write it  
9 this way -- if we write it the way that it originally  
10 is, we have a logo, a brown and yellow logo, UPS,  
11 and someone -- Mary Jane's Dress Shop wants to  
12 make a brown logo, I don't think -- I don't think  
13 that we have the right to say, "You can't use  
14 brown."

15 They'll say, "Well, there's brown right there.  
16 Why can't I do?"

17 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Because  
18 it -- it -- according to the way -- I don't want to  
19 speak for you, but I'm going to. According to the  
20 way Bill's done it, that brown can only be --

21 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: M-hm.

22 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: It means --

23 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: -- in their  
24 trademark --

25 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- the logo.

1 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: M-hm.

2 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: -- or the  
3 logo.

4 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Can only  
5 be --

6 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: -- not --

7 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: -- in the  
8 logo.

9 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: -- in the  
10 letters.

11 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: And --

12 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Not in

13 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: -- nobody  
14 ever said --

15 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- the channel  
16 sign --

17 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: -- life was  
18 fair.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- not in the  
20 channel letters or the rest of the sign.

21 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: I agree.

22 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Which it  
23 gets -- that -- that hits both sides of the street.

24 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: Okay.

25 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: I agree.

1 COUNCIL MEMBER FULCHER: Okay.

2 Fair enough.

3 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: All right.

4 So --

5 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: So,  
6 therefore, the other thing, if we're taking Frank's  
7 measure, which I believe we are, is the other  
8 change that we need to ru -- read in is to go back  
9 to the original language of the approved colors  
10 rather than --

11 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Except  
12 can we, please, include green?

13 COUNCIL MEMBER TUCCI: Sure.

14 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: All right.  
15 Well, and there -- and there --

16 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: No issue with  
17 that.

18 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Okay.  
19 Thank you.

20 COUNCIL MEMBER MILES: We are a  
21 green city, so. . .

22 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: Yeah.  
23 And there's lot of green signs. When I drove home  
24 last time, I was --

25 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Do you want

1 me to read --

2 COUNCIL MEMBER LEONARD: -- looking  
3 at them.

4 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: -- the whole  
5 thing?

6 MAYOR EVANS: One of us is going to  
7 have to --

8 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: I'll -- I'll take  
9 a stab at it.

10 MAYOR EVANS: Great.

11 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: [reads] City  
12 of Prospect, Ordinance Number 540, 2014. An  
13 Ordinance Relating to the Amendment and  
14 Modification of Chapter 157 of the Code of  
15 Ordinances of the City of Prospect.

16 WHEREAS, Chapter 157 of the Code of  
17 Ordinances of the City of Prospect governs sign  
18 regulations and standards within the City; and

19 WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of  
20 Prospect desires to amend Chapter 157 to define  
21 sign regulations and standard [sic] more clearly;  
22 and,

23 WHEREAS, City Council further desires to  
24 increase and facilitate the enforceability of the  
25 Ordinance.

1       NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE  
2       CITY OF PROSPECT, KENTUCKY:

3       SECTION 1: Whatever that curly Q is, 157.3  
4       is hereby amended and modified by adding a  
5       definition and inserting the following underlined  
6       language and deleting the following stricken  
7       language to read as follows:

8       APPROVED COLORS must consist of red,  
9       green, yellow, blue, white, or black colors in both  
10      lettering and background. Registered corporate  
11      logos and trademarks are excluded from this  
12      provision.

13      BANNER. A cloth, paper, fabric, or other  
14      material sign that is mounted on any wall, window,  
15      or other surface that identifies the business,  
16      commercial or retail center, or a specific event.

17      SECTION 2: 157.26 (B) is hereby amended  
18      and modified by inserting the underlined language  
19      and deleting the following stricken language as  
20      follows:

21      (1) Single freestanding commercial  
22      establishment, not part of a shopping center or  
23      other office complex.

24      (2) (b) 1. Number. Any -- one of each of the  
25      types listed; maximum of four. However, if any

1 individual business within a retail/shopping center  
2 occupies space with 100 feet or more of ground  
3 floor frontage in the center, that individual  
4 business may have two wall/marquee signs.

5 (2) (b) 3. a. Wall/marquee. The sign may not  
6 exceed 50% of the length of the facade or a have  
7 an area greater than 50 square feet and a length --  
8 and a maximum height of 3 feet, except, however,  
9 should the sign consist of "channel letters" and  
10 the facade exceed 20 feet in height, the area may  
11 be a maximum of 150 square feet and 6 feet in  
12 height.

13 SECTION 3: 157.4 is hereby amended by  
14 inserting the following underlines [sic] language:  
15 ELL. Signs with colors other than approved  
16 colors.

17 SECTION 4: All Ordinances or parts of the  
18 Ordinance in conflict with this Ordinance are  
19 hereby repealed.

20 SECTION 5: This Ordinance shall take effect  
21 from and after the passage, signing, and  
22 application [sic] as required by law.

23 MAYOR EVANS: Well done. Okay. So  
24 we've had the first reading of that ordinance. Put  
25 it over [phonetic] until the next meeting. And I

1 thank you all.

2 Comments from citizens?

3 AUDIENCE: [no response]

4 MAYOR EVANS: Why are you shaking  
5 your head?

6 MS. SPEAKER: It's no comment.

7 MAYOR EVANS: Okay. In that case, we  
8 will entertain a motion to adjourn.

9 COUNCIL MEMBER BRAB: Motion to  
10 adjourn.

11 COUNCIL MEMBER BOWLING: Second.

12 MAYOR EVANS: All in favor?

13 COUNCIL MEMBERS: Aye.

14 MAYOR EVANS: The meeting is  
15 adjourned.
